

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

At Foot of Lake Street and Calhoun Boulevard

May 30, 1942, 9:30 A. M.

History of Memorial

* * *

Naval Memorial Rock, Lake Street on the Shores of Lake Calhoun, was unveiled and dedicated on May 30, 1922, by the local unit of the Women's Naval Service, Inc., The Navy Mother's Club, and other patriotic organizations. Thereafter Memorial Day Services have been observed annually at this plot.

Minneapolis Navy-Marine Post No. 472 of the American Legion with the cooperation of the United States Navy Department in 1922, secured the Ship's Bell of the former U. S. S. Minneapolis. In 1930 the Memorial Mast was donated and erected, and during the Memorial Day ceremonies of that year the Ship's Bell was unveiled as a permanent mounting of the mast.

To preserve this Memorial to posterity, there was dedicated on May 30, 1931, and permanently attached to Memorial Mast, a Bronze Plaque to the memory of those Sailors and Marines who lost their lives in the World War.

Through the coopcration of the Memorial Day Association, the United States Navy Department and Minneapolis Navy-Marine Post, the steering wheel of the former U. S. S. Minnesota was acquired, and on May 30, 1932, was presented officially to Minneapolis Navy-Marine Post by the United States Navy Department in honor of the Sailors and Marine dead. This wheel was permanently mounted and presented to the City of Minneapolis during the Memorial Day Ceremonics of 1933.

In 1934, a Spandau machine gun which saw service with the U.S. Marines at Belleau Wood was presented to the Navy-Marine Post for future mounting and dedication.

The Marine Memorial, supporting a plaque on which are inscribed the names of 144 Marines who gave their lives for their country, was transferred from the University of Minnesota Campus to this plot and presented by the Minnesota Marines to the Minneapolis Park Board, on Memorial Day, 1936.

Miss Gish became famous through her characterizations in "Birth of a Nation," "Way Down East," "Orphans of the Storm" and many other movies. She turned to the legitimate stage in 1930, achieving eminence as Ophelia in "Hamlet," as Winnie Day in "Life with Father," and in other productions. She is back in Hollywood.

The Board of Directors and Staff of the Young Women's Christian Association of Duluth present their annual report to the members of the Association.

PURPOSE

To build a fellowship of women and girls devoted to the task of realizing in our common life those ideals of personal and social living to which we are committed by our faith as Christians.

In this endeavor we seek to undorstand Jesus, to share his love for all people, and to grow in the knowledge and love of God.

The girl on the cover who tells us that the Y.W.C.A. of Duluth was alert to community needs in 1943 does not tell a new story. The Y.W.C.A. has been practicing this alertness for 43 years and seeking with varying degrees of success to meet the needs discovered.

More than two years of war have made their impact on all citizens; yet girls' needs are basically the same, war or no war. Girls need friends, fun, satisfying work, a decent place to live, faith in the ultimate triumph of right. War intensifies those needs; the demands of the emergency put new and increased strains upon young women. The Y.W.C.A. has speeded up its programs on physical fitness, recreation, housing and personal counseling to keep girls fit for the domands of their work and for meeting their personal problems. Such program, with its training in democratic ways of work, is a vital part of the women-in-war offert. The many and varied program activities and services have been metivated, as always, by the unchanging Christian purpose of the Association.

There has been considerable turnover in the groups, due

to girls who have left town for the various uniformed services or for war jobs; due also to restlessness and resulting shifting of interests Groups have wanted more informal program than heretofore and have done a great deal of service related to the war, such as Red Cross, U. S. O., hospital work, etc.

The Y. W. C. A., through its Board, Committees, and Staff has worked closely with other community agencies on such problems as juvenile delinquency and day care of children of working mothers; has cooperated on community projects like the War Fund Campaign, Bond Drives, Civilian Defense programs, Christian Mission, etc.

The Y. W. C. A. faces the new year with appreciation of the understanding and support of the community. It accepts with humility the urgent challenge to make its services more adequate and far-reaching than ever before.

The following pages give a brief summary of the women and girls who came to the Y. W. C. A during 1943 and how the Y. W. C. A. has tried to meet their needs. GIRLS AND WOMEN WHO HAVE SOUGHT THE YWCA IN 1943

- O Children under 12, some of then "door key children",
 came to play, to learn to swim, to find leadership
 to help them grow.
- OJunior High and Serior High School Girls sought friends, understanding, advisership, fun, and an answer to the fundamental "need to be needed".
- O Campers, 8 18-yerr-olds, came from Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and North Dakota for vacation fun, an experience in cooperative living, and a chance for fellowship in a new environment.
- Employed girls from business establishments, homes, and industries sought fun and friends, release from tension, a new outlook on life, a medium through which to serve, widened knowledge, a chance to develop their capacities for leadership, and help with their work problems.
- Girls and women of all ages, seeking to keep physically
 fit for the demands of these busy days, came for
 a balanced health and recreation program, for a
 health exam, and for activities to improve old
 skills or to learn new ones and for relaxation.
- New Americans in Duluth came to the International
 Institute for friendliness, to play with others,
 to learn American ways, to work toward citizenship.
 People of various nationalities, races, and creeds
 participate without difference at the three
 centers of the Branch.
- O Negro girls and women came to meet new friends, for leadership expression, for self improvement and recreation and to help promote interracial understanding.

- O Young women and girls, chiefly newcomers in the city, came for a place to live, for companionship, for the protection of the "Y" while they retained their independence. Transient strangers sought short-time homes.
- O Community groups came to find a place for meetings, to play, to work, to plan.
 - Travelers, crowds of them of every description, sought advice, rest, information, and travel accompdations.
- Adventure-seeking girls trying to find their soldiers or sailors, wives wishing to join husbands working in the shipyards, and women out of employment came for temporary help while making their adjustments.
- O Volunteers came to carry responsibility and to render invaluable community service in the war effort.

Membership

Many of the above-named women and girls and many others came for the privilege of belonging to an organization which is a part of a great national and international Christian woman's movement with a purpose which inspires and a program which demands the best one has to give.

Community service included publishing USO Magazine, staffing of Bond Booths, parties for service men, program for Community Fund dinners and Christmas Projects.

Swimming was the most popular activity, including classes in Junior and Senior Life Saving, in cooperation with the Red Cross. Other sports included archery, badminton, volleyball, basketball, bicycling, tennis and golf.

Program includes clubs for boys and girls and informal recreation. The Institute serves as a meeting place for many community groups such as clinics, Nationality Lodges, Union meetings, andparties. Services to individuals included help on citizenship and immigration.

The "Y" Residence accommodates 75 permanent guests, chiefly girls 18 - 24 years of age, who help determine policies through their elected House Council.

O Travelers' Aid

Assistance of many kinds was given to 74 children, 42 boys and girls, 2112 210 men and women and 1786 service men.

Weary service-men removed the dust of travel in the office at the Union Depot, shaved and changed soiled clothes. Pillows eased the hard benches during hours of waiting - and the heavy sea bags or barracks bags could be left for a few hours under the care of the workers.

OPersonal Service Department

1. Advises and helps work out plans with those who have become confused or bewildered by the problems which they face.

2. Temporary care at THE ANNEX, an apartment maintained by the city and administered by the Y. W. C. A. has been given in 182 cases. Referrals from other agencies numbered 127; from the Y. W. C. A. 55.

@ Volunteer Leadership

241 individuals have served as volunteers, club leaders, members of the Board of Directors, and of various committees and councils.


