## Memorial Services

Conducted by NAVY MARINE POST No. 472 AMERICAN LEGION


MEMORIAL ROCK
At Foot of Lake Street and Calhoun Boulevard May 30, 1942, 9:30 A. M. Auspices of Memorial Day Association For Freedom and Liberty Buy War Savings Bonds and Stamps

Naval Memorial Rock, Lake Street on the Shores of Lake Calhoun, was unveiled and dedicated on May 30, 1922, by the local unit of the Women's Naval Service, Inc., The Navy Mother's Club, and other patriotic organisations. Thereafler Memorial Day Services have been observed anmually at this plot.

Minncapolis Navy-Marine Post No. 472 of the American Legion with the cooperation of the United States Navy Department in 1922, secured the Ship's Bell of the former U. S. S. Minneapolis. In 1930 the Memorial Mast zuas donated and erected, and dwring the Memorial Day coremonies of that year the Ship's Bell was unveiled as a permanent mownting of the mast.

To preserve this Memorial to posterity, there was dedicated on May 30, 1931, and permanently attached to Memorial Mast, a Bronse Plaque to the memory of those Sailors and Marines who lost their lives in the World War.

Through the coopcration of the Memorial Day Association, the United States Navy Department and Minneapolis Navy-Marine Post, the steering wheel of the former U. S. S. Minnesota was acquired, and on May 30, 1932, was presented officially to Minneapolis Navy-Marine Post by the United States Navy Department in honor of the Sailors and Marine dead. This wheel was permanently mounted and presented to the City of Minneapolis during the Memorial Day Ceremonies of 1933.

In 1934, a Spandau machine gun which saw service with the U. S. Marines at Bellean Wood was presented to the Navy-Marine Post for future mounting and dedication.

The Marine Memorial, supporting a plaque on which are inscribed the names of 144 Marines who gave their lives for their country, was transferred from the University of Minnesota Campus to this plot and presented by the Minnesota Marines to the Minneapolis Park Board, on Menorial Day, 1936.

 Convocations-Fall Quarter, 1943September 30 -Opening convocation-Address to students by President Coffey.
October 7-Lillian Gish-Topic: From Hollywood to Broadway.
Miss Gish became famous through her characterizations in "Birth of a Nation," "Way Down East," "Orphans of the Storm" and many other movies. She turned to the legitimate stage in 1930, achieving eminence as Ophelia in "Hamlet," as Winnie Day in "Life with Father," and in other productions. She is back in Hollywood.
October 14-W. T. Benda-Topic: Lecture-Demonstration on Masks.
Painter, illustrator and creator of the Benda Masks, Mr. Benda will discuss and demonstrate his masks in pantomime and dance. His masks have been used in stage productions since 1918 , both here and abroad.
October 21-Dean Howard Higgins-Topic: Among the Spirits.
Mr. Higgins is dean of Emerson College, Boston, and head of its division of pyschology and education. He has studied extensively in magic and spirit mediumship. He will present a convincing seance and later explain how it was done. He is the author of "Influenoing Behavior Through Speech."

The Board of Direotors and Staff of the Young Wonon's Christion Association of Duluth prosont thoir annunl report to the nombers of the Association.

## PURPOSE

To build a fellowship of women and girls dovoted to the task of realizing in our common lifo those idoals of porsonal and social living to which we are connitted by our faith as Christians.

In this endoavor we soek to undorstand Josus, to share his lovo for all poople, and to grow in tho knowlodgo and lovo of God .

Tho girl on the cover who tolls us that the Yail.C.A. of Duluth was alort to ooramity noods in 1923 doos not tell a now story. The Y,ii,C.A, has boon practicing this alortnoss for 43 years and seoking with varying degreos of suocess to moet the noods discoverod.

More than two yoers of var have rado thoir impact on $a .11$ oitizons; yot girls' noeds are basically the sane, war or no war. Girls noed frionds, fun, satisfying worle, a docont place to livo, faith in tho ultimato triumph of right. Nar intonsifios thoso noods; the domands of the emergency put new and inoroasod strains upon young wonon, Tho Y.i., C.A. has spoodod up its programs on physical fitness, recroation, housing and personal counsoling to koep girls fit for the donands of thoir work and for noeting thoir porsonal problams. Such progran, with its training in domocratio ways of work, is a vital part of the womon-in-war offort. The many and variod progran activitios and sorvioss have beon motivatod, as always, by tho unchanging Christian purpose of the Association.
Thero has been considorable turnover in the groups, due
to girls who havo loft town for tho various uniformed services or for war jobs; due also to restlessness and resulting shifting of interests Groups have wanted more informal program than heretofore and have done a great deal of service related to the war, such as Red Cross, U. S. O. , hospital mork, etc.

The Y. I. C. A., through its Board, Committees and Staff has worked closely with other community agencies on such problems as juvenile delinquency and day care of children of morking mothers; has cooperated on commini ty projects like the War Fund Campaign, Bond Drives, Civilian Defense programs, Christian Mission, etc.

The Y. W. C. A. faces the new year with appreciation of the understanding and support of the comunity. It accepts with hamility the urgent challenge to make its services more adequate and far-reaching than ever before.

The following pages give a brief summary of the romen and girls who came to the Y. W. C. A during 1943 and hom the Y . $\mathbb{\pi}$. C. A. hes tried to meet their needs.

## GIRLS AND WOMEN WHO HAVE SOUGHT THE YTCA IN 1943

Children under 12, some of them "door key children", came to play, to learn to swim, to find loaderehip to help them grow.

OJunior High and Serior High School Girls sought friends, understanding, advisership; fun, and an answer to the fundonental "noed to be needed".

O
Campers, $8-18$-yorr-olds, came fron Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and North Dakota for vacation fun, an experience in cooperative living, and a chance for fullowshif in a new enviroment.

0
Employed girla frow business establishments, homes, and inaustries sought fun and friends, release from tension, a nev outlook on life, a mediun through which to serve, widened knowledge, a chance to develop their copacities for leadership, and help with their work problems.

Girls and women of all ages, seeking to keep physically fit for the demands of these busy days, cane for a balanced henlth and recreation progran, for a health exan, $\varepsilon$ nd for activities to improve old skills or to learn ner ones and for relaxation.

New Americans in Duluth came to the International Institute for friendiness, to play with others, to learn Anerican ways, to work toward citizenship. People of various nationalities, races, and creeds participate without difference at the three centers of the Branch.

ONegro girls and wonen cane to meet new friends, for leadership exi ression, for self improvement and recreation and to help promote interracial understanding.

Young women and girls, chiefly newcomers in the city, came for a place to live, for companionship, for the protection of the "Y" while they retained their independence. Transient strangers sought short-time homes.

Community groups cane to find a place for meetings, to play, to work, to plan.

Travelers, - crowds of then - of every description, sought advice, rest, information, and travel acconodations.

OAdventure-seeking girls trying to find their soldiers or sailors, wives vishing to join husbands porking in the shipyards, and women out of employment came for temparary help while making their adjustrients.

Volunteers came to earry responsibility and to render invaluable comunity service in the war effort.

Yembership
Kany of the above-named momen and girls and many others canie for the privilege of belonging to an organization which is a part of a great national and international Christian monan's movenent with a purpose which inspires and a progran which deaands the best one has to give.
