Glad you are getting Gould interested in the situation. I have been summoned before Interstate Commerce Commission, Chicago, for the twenty-second; Mellen for twenty-fourth.... I have information, which can be relied upon, that the Interstate Commerce Commission will no longer consider these matters as they have done in the past. By taking severe action they are finding out so many discriminations in favor of big shippers, and other irregularities, that it will give them an opportunity to go before Congress and increase their power very materially."
