On the evening of April 10 in my first radio address in this campaign, I called upon the present mayor of this city to set aside the week of April 23 to April 29 as United Nationa week. I called to your attention that the mayor of this city had failed in his obligation to provide effective leadership in bringing to the attention of our people the importance of the great proposals for international peace and security, as laid down at Dumbarton Oaks and Breton Woods. During the past week I noted with great satisfaction that, after having called to the attention of our mayor his lack of leadership and his apparent unconcern with the great work of the San Francisco conference, he did set aside a period of time to be known as United Nations Week. It is unfortunate, however, that our chief executive has to be reminded of his civic responsibilities. -Itis even more disconcerting that the mayor of this city has seen fit to make political capital by belated statements, telegrams and proclamations concerning the great conference which is to take place at San Francisco. Let every citizen remember that in the summer months of 1944 in the recent national campaign the present mayor of this city showed no concern about the United Nations. We is not on record as ever having given a single speech on behalf of the United Nations. A It is doing things that counts, them, insofar as the promotion of the cause of the United Nations is concerned, the present mayor of this city is counted out.

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
