He is a board member of the North Side Athletic Club and active in the Y M C A and the Boy Scouts movement. He is a member of the Urban League Board, Chairman of the Blind Services Committee, and Chairman of the Council of Social Agencies. He was a member of the Minneapolis Citizens Committee of Education. He served as chairman of the Minneapolis Hennepin County Youth Conference.

That is quite an impressive record. Surely such responsibility, such civic consciousness and such spirited leadership is adequate testimony as to his qualifications for the important position of Mayor of Minneapolis.

A moment ago I mentioned that John Simmons was Chairman of the Minneapolis Hennepin County Youth Conference and had actively participated in Y W C A and Boy Scout activities. I ask the parents of Minneapolis, "Is it not important to have a man as Mayor of the City who understands young people, has worked with them, and has gained their respect and affection?" John Simmons has that respect and has that ability to lead, and to guide, and to work with young men and young women.

There is just one other civic program in which John Simmons has actively participated that I wish to call to your attention. Many people these days are mentioning their work in behalf of housing, and much good work has been done and, to the permit the compact to be done. I wonder how many Minneapolis citizens remember back to 1946 when we had a charter amendment election to permit the City of Minneapolis to participate in the Federal program of slum-clearance and low-cost, low-rent housing. Reading the Minneapolis are as a state law that would permit cities like Minneapolis to obtain Federal government assistance in cleaning out slums and blighted areas. We were denied millions of dollars of Federal money - money that we paid in taxes, - simply because we did not have a state law that permitted Minneapolis, or any other city, to have a housing authority.

behalf of the housing amendment. It was John Simmons who went out and helped raise money so that we could carry the message of housing over the radio and through the press. It was John Simmons who gave many a speech and attended dozens of meetings in order to enlist public support for this amendment. That amendment received approximately 55% of the vote. It required 57% for it to be adopted. But that election served notice on the Legislature that the people -

John Simmons was in the fight for housing. He demonstrated his leadership when leadership was hard to find and sorely needed.

John Simmons served on the Emergency Housing Committee in the summer and fall of 1945, five or six months before the City Council passed

an emergency housing ordinance. I remember this because it was then that as Mayor of our City that I needed help. We had thousands of veterans and their families registered in need of emergency housing, and John Simmons helped get it. Even before the governing body of the city acted.

John Simmons has a deep and expert knowledge of the housing problem. He will give leadership to a broad and comprehensive housing and redevelopment program in our city. Your Congress is acting to make this possible. John Simmons, as your Mayor, will take immediate steps to insure Minneapolis' participation in this program.
