Senator Hubert H. Humphrey declared last night in an address at a Seventh District

DFL "Bean Feed" at Redwood Falls.

"Like other farmers throughout the midwest, Minnesota family farmers have completely lost faith in Secretary Benson--and in the Republican Party which he represents," Senator Humphrey declared.

"Secretary Benson has been the most costly Secretary of Agriculture in our history--costly to farmers, and costly to taxpayers. He has spent more money, with less results to show for it, than any other Secretary we have ever had. He has broken faith with farm people--and they are fully justified in repudiating him and the party that keeps him in power."

Secretary Benson "didn't just happen", Senator Humphrey reminded his audience.

"He is the Republican Secretary of Agriculture, appointed by a Republican President who was supported and elected by the Republican Party. He is the Republican's 'hired man', carrying out Republican policies.

"The only way farmers have of showing they do not want him is to vote against Republicans. Secretary Benson does not dare risk running for office himself, but he will claim as a personal victory the election of any Republican in the midwest farm belt.

"The way to help check Bensonizing of Agriculture is to vote against $\underline{\text{any}}$ Republicans."
