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Democrats are "more interested in building dams than dedicating them,"
Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D., Minn.) declared today at a breakfast meeting of Wasco County Democrats at The Dalles.

Referring to the approaching visit of Vice President Nixon to The Dalles, Senator Humphrey declared:

"They tell me the Vice President is expected three days from now for the ostensible purpose of dedicating the great Dalles Dam. I know it will be a gala occasion -- but I hope it is also an occasion for some sober thought. We Democrats are more interested in building dams than in dedicating them.

"Yet I feel it is somewhat unfair division of labor, for the Democrats get the dams in the Columbia Basin studied, authorized, built or building, and the Republicans do nothing except dedicate them.

"This is particularly true since the Eisenhower Administration has never proposed one single new start in the Pacific Northwest, and has consistently attempted to starve out the power program completely," Seretor Humphyley Leclared.

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Excerpts from his remarks follow:

"Back in 1952, Candidate Eisenhower, told the region in his famous

'partnership' speech in Seattle, that 'Power development in the Northwest must and will go forward. In this continuing program, the Federal Government will play its full part'.

"Again by coincidence, when he happened to be on hand during the election campaign of 1954 to dedicate another Democratic dam - McNary - while Dick Neuberger was sending shivers down the spines of Republicans in Oregon, President Eisenhower said: 'McNary dam ... is an example of national responsibility properly assumed by the Federal Government....

I shall continue to recommend Federal construction of such beneficial projects. New ones will be started...'

"If you wish to guage the President's sincerity, check his budget messages of each successive year. There is not one single recommendation for a new power start in this or any other region.

Democratic Congresses led by your fighting Senators -- Wayne Morse and Dick Neuberger, Senators Magnuson and Jackson, and the other members of the Democratic Senatorial delegation from the Columbia Basin states.

"And with the Dalles Project as a case in point, the Vice President could have come out at least a year and perhaps two years earlier, to dedicate it -- if the Eisenhower administration, early in its first term of office, hadn't cut construction funds so drastically as to stretch out the Army Engineers' construction schedule far beyond the anticipated date of completion.

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"I seem to recall the Vice President visiting the great state of Oregon during the 1956 Presidential election campaign, and telling the people about the accomplishments of the Eisenhower 'partnership' power and natural resources policy.

"The Vice President said: 'All the resources of America, federal, state, and local, must be tapped to provide for the dynamic development of our natural resources on the scale that is necessary if our economy is to continue to expand and grow. That is why the triple-barrelled Eisenhower partnership program will do the job where a single-shot federal program will not'.

That devastating, triple-barrelled discharge from the Eisenhower partnership blunderbuss has made a sound suspiciously like a popgun.

Perhaps the Vice President can tell the crowd at The Dalles dedication not ceremonies, that he didn't know it was/loaded. As far as I have been able to ascertain, the only efforts made to implement 'partnership' in this immediate area were:

- (1) The partnership proposal at John Day under which the private electric utilities would get the gravy for 50 years and Oregon and neighboring States would get high cost power, while Uncle Sam would build the non-power features that return no revenues with taxpayers money.
- (2) The backing down to the private utilities by the Eisenhower Administration at Hells Canyon. The result: Wastage of 75% of the storage capability, 50% of the power production, and what power that is now or will eventually become available from the private 3-dam project

the great Hells Canyon project, if the administration hadn't scuttled it.

"The Federal Goernment, through its power and resources agencies, is no longer planning ahead for a Federal power program which would provide energy for new or expanded industry.

"The Democratic power program, as all of you know, was major spark which transformed this region's economy.

"Now, dam building is slackening off, and the region has suffered almost as much as any other depressed area in the nation from economic slowdown. This is simply because the great potential of the Colubmia for low-cost power and for pure water supply to future industry is not being adequately developed by a continuous program.

"And yet, in the face of failure of partnership, Eisenhower-Nixon style," the provide the program needed to once again set the region marching forward economically on the foundation of its vast energy resource that flows in its rivers, the Vice President will be here to dedicate the kind of project which he and his fellow Republicans oppose with every fibre of their 18th Century souls.

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"As a 1956 editorial in the Nashville Tennessean commented, after the Vice President had visited the Valley to 'support' TVA, after the President had called it 'creeping socialism', and Dixon-Yates had been arranged by White House directive:

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"'With much more of the support (Mr. Nixon so blandly promises),
TWA will be deader than a door nail.'

L"I can only add that with each Republican dedication of a Democratic dam in the Pacific Northwest, the possibility of getting the kind of forward looking resources program the region needs for strengthening the foundations of its economic growth, will continue to be very dim indeed.

"Of course, Congress overrode on its second attempt, the President's veto of the Public Works appropriations bill which contains money for vitally needed Oregon projects -- the Harney rural electric cooperative transmission line to provide it with Bonneville power, money to proceed with John Day construction, money for the Cougar project, and planning funds for Green Peter dam, not to mention others not directly affecting hydroelectric power.

"But the President's widding of the veto club to oppose all domestic resources development, except that which his budget Bureau doles out from a medicine dropper, is a powerful brake against the kind of programs this region and the nation is the budget Bureau doles out from

"This means only one thing, that a new administration is needed to work with a liberal Democratic Congress, dedicated to the historic conservation principles of half a century, as modified by the tremendously increased tempo of our civilization's technological advances, and the nation's population explosion.

SENATOR HUMPHREY CALLS FOR GREATER FARMER-VOICE IN FARM PROGRAMS

It is time for "farmers themselves" to have a greater voice in development of a more effective farm program. Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D., Minn.) declared today at a luncheon meeting at Pendleton, Oregon, of Umtilla County Democrats.

"We need an agricultural stabilization program far less costly to the American taxpayers than the present inexcusable mess -- yet one that is far more effective in its protection of family farmers and their contribution to the American economy.

"We need an agricultural stabilization program that permits agriculture to keep pace with the rest of our expanding economy in terms of income, yet one that does not make the farmer dependent on the government for that income.

"We need a program that recognizes the need for farmers to help themselves through cooperative action for bargaining power, and for whatever production adjustments may be necessary to make the best use of our human, soil, and water resources.

"We need a program tailored to the vast technological changes, yet one that does not sacrifice the human and social values of our traditional American pattern of family-owner operated farms.

"We need a program that recognizes the farmer's stewardship responsibility for conserving productivity of our land for the sake of future generations, yet recognizes too that the entire nation

shares that same responsibility.

"We need a program that really does something about surpluses
-- making use of what we have, and adjusting production to keep
from building up more beyond the level of possible need.

"Above all, we need a national food policy closely meshed with our farm policy, so that we can better gear our productive resources to the real needs of humanity at home and abroad -- instead of producing for government storage bins."

Senator Humphrey said he had used those guidelines in preparing the Family Farm Program Development Act introduced shortly before the end of the first session of the present Congress, and will press for action on the bill at the next session.

"We haven't all the answers in Congress -- but we can get better answers from farmers themselves than we can from Secretary Benson.

"That is why my measure calls for farm commodity groups to develop details of their own program within fixed guidelines, with Congress acting in the role of protecting the over-all national interest in giving final approval to farmer-developed and farmer-approved programs."

Senator Humphrey said farm people and city people alike "Need to do some soul searching" regarding neglect of America's agricultural producers.

"Rather than stumble and drift along blindly because of a vacuum of sound farm policy leadership from the present Republican Administration, we all need to make some honest appraisal of what we really want and need -- and the alternatives we face," he declared.

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Farmers from Umatilla and other surrounding counties, as well as other citizens, heard Hubert H. Humphrey (D., Minn.) declare at a luncheon meeting here today, that it is time for "farmers themselves" to have a greater voice in development of a more effective farm program.

U.S. MUST KEEP MANTLE OF PEACEMAKER, SENATOR HUMPHREY DECLARES

America must never "drop the mantle of peacemaker, and let it be paraded falsely before the rest of the world by the Soviet Union," Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D., Minn.) declared last night in an address before a public meeting sponsored by the Klamath County Democratic central committee.

"We must grasp and keep the initiative as the peacemaker, and not let Khrushchev run away with it," Senator Humphrey told the crowd assembled at the K. C. Hall. "Our goal must be a safeguarded system of disarmament to relieve mankind of the crushing arms burden, but we should assert the leadership in seeking that goal-rather than appear to be reluctantly dragged in that direction.

"Despite our knowledge that most of Khrushchev's presentation to the United Nations was cleverly designed propaganda, there are many things he said that it would have been better to have had our country say first - to have had our President say to the United Nations and the world.

"Now that Khrushchev has said them, however, let's take a serious look at his proposals -- and seek some evidence of good faith toward working toward them. We can test that good faith by pressing forward on the first necessary step of establishing an effective inspection system to enforce prohibition of nuclear tests.

Then let us move forw ard aggressively ourselves, with our own positive works of peace programs -- with deeds, rather than words.

"Let us never forget that there are many more people in this world who want to live, than w ant to die.

"Let us not forget that millions of people have lived under conditions of tyranny and terror for so long that there is nothing more that can be done to frighten them.

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"What they seek is help, guidance, friendship, understanding.

"What this world needs today is not massive retaliation, but massive doses of health, education, and food.

"We need some guided missiles to the hearts and minds of men -- missiles of technology and science, missiles of schools and education; yes, missiles of medicine and medical care -- of jobs and industry, of public works and public welfare.

"It is to the creation of these missiles that we must dedicate our talents and our energies.

"We must wage peace, while we defend ourselves against attack.

"We must move on the offensive, and declare war against mankind's most ancient and terrible enemies of hunger, disease, poverty, and ignorance.

"It must be a war of deeds -- the kind of deeds that we Americans have demonstrated our ability to accomplish and perform.

"We need a bold, new "Food for Peace" program, dedicating our God-given abundance to serving the needs of humanity -- rather than complaining about it.

"We need a dramatic, worldwide 'Health for Peace' program, with vastly expanded international medical research.

"We need to launch a broad program of world educational development -- æ plan for 'Education for Peace'.

These are truly the 'Works of Peace'."
