REPUBLICAN PARTY BOTH CORRUPT AND COMPLACENT: HUMPHREY

Lincoln, Hebraska - Hovember 7 -- Senator Hubert H. Humphrey lashed out at the Republican Administration tonight accusing it of turning the other cheek while scandals and corruption abound within.

"But", he told the Hebraska Democratic Convention, even with the internal scandals we have uncovered, "the worst corruption is the misuse of human and natural resource."

Said the Minnesota Senator: "The Republican Administration stands indicted by its own corruption. But the most damning indictment, for which this Administration will stand convicted by history, is that they have not strengthened the country but weakened it."

In its gross complacency and "all is well" attitude, the Republicans "have surrendered the initiative we had earned by the Truman Doctrine, the Marshall Plan, Point Four and Mutual Security.

"The Republican Administration has stood still behind a Maginot line of complacency and self-righteousness while the Russians have outflanked us in political and economic maneuver as well as in missiles and rocketry," he charged.

At the same time, Senator Humphrey emphasized the three great tasks ahead of us that we must fulfill. These are, he said:

."We must break out of the economic strait jacket that has tied us down these past six years and restore the growth and productivity and equity of which our economy is capable.

."We must insure to every American full freedom, dignity, justice and equality of opportunity.

. "We must achieve a just and enduring peace."

REMARKS OF SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

Remember the "hound's tooth" that the present Republican Administration was going to be "as clean as"? Don't you sometimes wonder what happened to it? - Kelling Hatalet

The Republican motto has been: "See no evil; hear no evil; speak no evil" -- of Republicans, that is. But the evil has been there, all the same. And all the sanctimonious varnish that has been painted over it will not cause the country to overlook it or forget it.

An endless stream of pious Eisenhower-isms and a forgiving and partisan press have treated the Republican lapses from personal and political morality as if they were innocent pranks of political juveniles. But look at the record.

It was not only that the country has been run according to "what's good for General Motors" -- though that bit of unconscious candor was scandalous enough.

There was the case of the Republican National Chairman who resigned when he was caught collecting a fee for selling the State of Kansas property it already owned.

And there was the case of the Commissioner of Public Buildings who recommended to a subordinate that a government contract be awarded to an active client of his engineering firm -- in which he kept a 90 percent interest. This same Commissioner was the one caught pressing a claim against the Government on behalf of his

former firm while holding high Government office. But then he said it was all right because he did it "during his lunch hour"!

Well, no one in "The Great Crusade" saw reason to fire him for these enterprising pranks. And when he resigned, his boss praised him for his "loyalty to the Administration" and his "fine attitude". The boss's tolerance became a little more understanding when, a few months later, he in turn got caught steering insurance contracts to his own political patron. He, too, resigned -- not at the request of the White House, but with the best wishes of its principal tenant.

The corruption was not confined to the fringes of the Administration and the Republican Party. It reached into the Cabinet and into the White House itself. The Secretary of the Air Force apparently saw nothing amiss in using his official position, and his official stationery, to make persuade defense contractors to do business with a firm in which he had a half interest and from which he received more than \$100,000 in profits while he was Secretary of the Air Force. Five percent wasn't enough for these influence peddlers -- they were "50 percenters"!

In reward for his private enterprise in public office, Secretary Tailor, when he resigned, received Presidential commendation for his "diligence" and his "fine accomplishments", and a special air display and the Defense Department's highest civilian award. He was diligent, all right.

Then there was the Assistant Secretary of Defense who was doing business (in his wife's name!) with the Defense Department. The Comptroller General called this "repugnant to public policy,"

but the President praised his Assistant Secretary for the "service" he rendered and his "contribution" to the Department's programs -- though it would seem that some of the "contributions" were the other way round.

I'm sure you remember the Dixon'Yates scandal which led through the Budget Bureau to the Executive Office of the President It has always struck me as strange that the Curator of Hounds' Teeth professed never to see anything improper in this palpable conflict of interest.

And you remember the scandals in the Federal Communications Commission -- in which votes for allocating TV channels were sought -- and even bought -- with cash and favors.

And, of course, that scandal to end all scandals -- we hope! -in the innermost sanctum of the White House itself, which ended in the departure of Sherman Adams and the contempt sentence on Bernard Goldfine. How "revealing' that none of these "crusading" Republicans could see anything wrong withouts in the way Governor Adams used his perch on top of the White House to nudge Federal agencies on behalf of his old friend and benefactor, Mr. Goldfine. Mr. Eisenhower's comment was a stubborn "I respect Adams because of his personal and official integrity," and a plaintive "I need him." It took the up-coming shadow of the 1958 elections to convince Governor Adams to offer his resignation and the President to accept it. Take liberties with the publici interest -yes, but not with the political interests of the Republican Party!
