America has fallen for a kind of "pitch" in our national life that substitutes nonsense for reality, public relations for public service, and showmanship for leadership, make believe for Klalik

This has happened to us not only in the world of TV | Popularity of "entertainment" but in politics and government as well.

We have been lured away from the good old American values of truth and reality and of not trying to be anybody but ourselves.

Let's face facts. Let's get back to reality. Let's forget the make-up men and go ahead and let the blemishes show. Let's grapple with the questions that nobody has supplied advance answers to. Let's put honesty to work again.

I for one do not intend to seek controversy for controversy's sake; but neither do I intend to shun a fight when a vital issue is at stake. Nor have I any intention of going around this country uttering sweet nothings in order to avoid getting people mad at me. And I urge upon my party that it act likewise. If we fail to act boldly and honestly on the great issues facing us we will not win next year and we will not deserve to win.

Between now and next summer, when the parties will adopt platforms and nominate candidates, I intend to go wherever and whenever I can in order to raise questions, discuss the issues, encourage debate, and urge thoughtful appraisal of how America is facing up to the problems of the 1960's.
