MINNESOTA PADIO TAPE OF JANUARY 8, 1963

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Ladies and gentlemen and fellow Mirmesotans ---

This is your Senator, Habert Humphrey, reporting to you

from my office on Capitol Hill in Weshington, D. C.

First I want to thank each of you for listening. I hope all of you will tune in to this station each week to hear my report from Washington.

And I want to thank this station for broadcasting these programs. It gives me one of the best means possible to inform you---the citizens of Minnesota---of important developments in Washington which affect our State and our Nation.

The 88th Congress convened last week, and once again Washington seemed to come alive again after three months of recess. There is an exciting mood in the Nation's capitol now. Hope is strong for greater progress for the Nation as a New Year and a New Congress begin.

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Right now I want to tell you about the first efforts for progress in this First Session of the 88th Congress.

The filibuster is a device used in the Senate to kill legislative proposals by endless talk and debate. Even though a particular bill may have been approved by all the appropriate Senate committees, and even though a majority of the Senate may favor the bill, it can be killed by a small minority of Senators who use a continuing torrent of words to keep it from coming to a vote.

Right now, two thirds of the Senate must agree to what we call "cloture"--the ending of debate on a bill so that the full Senate can vote to approve
or reject the bill. Our effort right now is to reduce the size of the vote

necessary to end debate. We agree that ample time should be given for debate of any bill, but we are fighting for a new rule to assure that debate itself is not used as a <u>trick</u> to prevent the Senate from casting a decision on legislation.

The other step for progress in the first part of the 88th Congress is

the <u>first</u> bill to be introduced in the Senate. The bill now numbered "S. 1"

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is a establish a Youth Conservation Corps.

You have heard me discuss the Youth Conservation Corps before. This year, the need for a Y.C.C. is greater than ever before, and this year my measure has been given top priority by other Congressional leaders and by the President and his Administration.

The greater need for a Youth Conservation Corps this year is dramatized by the tragic rise in unemployment among young men in Minnesota and throughout the Nation.

Almost 16 per cent of the out-of-school teen-agers and young adults in this country are now unemployed. The rise of unemployment among them

has been rising steadily in recent months. The establishment of a Youth Conservation Corps---putting young men and boys to work on conservation programs in the Nation's forests and parks---can help to halt this rise, and put an end to delinquency-breeding joblessness.

This is our start in the 88th Congress. I am confident this will be a year of progress, and I hope you will join me each week on this station to follow the course of our progress in Congress.

One effort which I and several other Senators from both parties are leading is to change the rules of the Senate to end the tyranny of the filibuster, which each year wastes time, blocks the flow of legislation and—for a period of weeks or even months—makes a mockery of our representative government.

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
