HUMPHREY URGES DENTISTS TO JOIN WAR "FOR A BETTER WORLD"

CHICAGO, February 3 - Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) urged American dentists tonight to join in the "war for a better world."

Speaking before the mid-winter meeting of the Chicago Dental Society, the Senate Majority Whip said the 100,000 members of the American Dental Association could form part of the civilian army that is needed to wage the war on poverty at home and secure peace throughout the world.

He said that just as dentists must begin major dental work by x-raying a person's teeth, the American people must "x-ray the problem areas of American society--urban blight, 'central city' traffic congestion, suburban sprawl, jammed recreation areas, polluted air or cities and contaminated water in the countryside, rising crime rates, school drop-outs, teenage unemployment, and persistent unemployment in depressed areas."

Senator Humphrey said one "x-ray" tool that is needed is the Commission on Automation, Technology and Employment, which he has proposed on behalf of the Johnson Administration.

This Commission would be directed to study and analyze the impact of automation and then plan ways of coping with the problems.

The Senator also predicted that the second session of the 88th Congress would prove to be "among the most fruitful in American history."

He said the year 1964 will witness the enactment of such major legislation as : a tax reduction bill, a comprehensive civil rights measure, a Youth Conservation Corps and a National Service Corps, expanded programs of education, a massive housing program, mass transit development and some form of employer-employee pre-payments for hospital and nursing home care of the elderly.

Looking ahead, our needs for still more specialized manpower are enormous. The fastest growing occupational group in America consists of the professions - notably teaching.
