EXCERPTS FROM REMARKS BY THE VICE PRESIDENT AT MARYLAND'S SALUTE TO VICE PRESIDENT HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

Baltimore, Maryland - March 29, 1965

Vice President Humphrey said Monday night that President Johnson is going down in history as the "freedom and opportunity President."

Speaking at a Democratic fund-raising dinner in his honor at the Baltimore Civic Center, the Vice President said that the central commitment of President Johnson and his Administration is to "expand the frontiers of freedom and opportunity in America."

Humphrey said this expansion is already taking place on many fronts and he cited:

- * The massive effort to improve education in America. 'House approval last week of the President's program of aid to elementary and secondary schools is just the beginning of this effort,' Humphrey said.
- * The concerted effort to protect the fundamental liberties of our own people and secure their constitutional rights. Humphrey said that President Johnson's stirring denunciation and declaration of war on the Ku Klux Klan is a sharp challenge to the forces of darkness and ignorance in America.
- * The War on Poverty, which is aimed at giving those who need help the opportunity to help themselves.

"At the same time the President is expanding the frontiers of freedom here in America", the Vice President said, "he is defending freedom in Vietnam and he has pledged American support to the flag of freedom wherever it flies."

I would be negligent here tonight if I did not also ask for your support for something else: for the belief that the world need not destroy itself by war, and that we Americans can help others, too, find a better society.

of himself. We stand for free speech and for Human deputy government of the people. We stand for peace We stand for the belief that without conquest. others, too, in less fortunate places should have opportunity for the blessings of abundance and should be free of tyranny. We stand for the pledges made by men and women who left the old ways and fought a living out of the soil of a new continent. President Johnson has made his commitment to all of us. I join him in that commitment. We ask your help.
