State Govit Your state and local governments will collect an estimated 47 million dollars more in revenue this year than last year because of better business conditions. This will provide greater resources for local self-help programs -- programs for building new schools and hospitals and other community improvements. Better business means increased consumer purchasing power. And because of the Johnson Administration's income tax and excise tax reduction programs lowans will have 182 million dollars more to spend this year than last. This means an average 60 dollars of additional purchasing power in the hands of

each Iowa family.



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to 14 Billim 1965 The heart of Iowa's economic growth depends on the soil. Gross income per lowa farm was almost 18 thousand dollars last year -- 900 a year more than in 1963; 3,400 dollars a year more than in 1960. the gross income per farm nationally was over 12 thousand dollars. From the beginning of this Administration, it has been the firm conviction of President Johnson that parity of opportunity and income should be restored to the farmers and the people of rural America. I share that conviction. And so do your **and** Democratic Congressmen.

Your government is working cooperatively with your state and local officials to restore depressed communities

to construct new water systems and sewage
treatment facilities . . . to build new low cost housing
and to control pollution of lakes, streams and dams.
lowa's precious water resources are being safeguarded
under a program of watershed protection and flood control.
Forty-three million dollars have been made available this
year for flood control projects in this state.

The Small Business Administration has signed nearly 200 contracts with those in your business community who are looking for new opportunity.

A 53-million-dollar highway improvement program is helping to make your roadways more modern and safe. Three million dollars has been allocated for hospital construction in this state. And Social Security health insurance benefits -- under our new program -will pay out an estimated 22 million dollars to many of lowa's 350,000 eligible participants in 1966. We are working together to bring progress to this state. Our goal is to create a climate of opportunity and encourage initiative and self-reliance for all our people.

High on our priority list is the problem of the American farmer, and how he can live successfully with the abundance he produces.

It is a problem that has plagued agriculture for more than thirty years. But the 89th Congress has taken a giant step toward solving this problem by passing the Food and Agricultural Act of 1965. Few people yet realize the enormous significance of this legislation.

This new program represents parity of opportunity for rural America. It is a major breakthrough toward better farm income, better use of our land resources, maximum use of our marketing systems both at home and abroad, and assures continued abundance for all our people.

In my judgement this is the soundest and most effective farm program that has ever been enacted.

It reflects the best judgement of Congress out of thirty years of experience with farm programs. And it incorporates the best of proven programs with new features for progress and better living in rural areas.

For example: Experience with the feed grain 📭 and the wheat programs since 1961 has taught us that direct payments to the farmer who voluntarily reduces his production can strengthen farm income. help eliminate surpluses and mointh enable the balance between production ar marketplace at home and abroad to function efficiently. Most important, this legislation establishes 🦚 program over a four-year period for most basic commodities -- eliminating the uncertainty and confusion which them from making long range operating plans.

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The feed grain program will assure annual income for more than two million feed grain farmers that will be some two billion dollars per year above the 1961 level.

It will permit further orderly reductions in surplus feed grain stocks which already are more than 30 million tons below the record high of 83 million tons a the **160**, end of the 1960 marketing year, and will reduce the Commonity Credit Corporation investment which was 3.4 billion dollars in 1960, and is now only two billion dollars.

The feed grain program has proved to be the best stabilizer ever devised for the livestock and poultry industry. Livestock men need no longer gamble from year to year as to the prices of feed. They can now make long-range plans. One of the most important sections of this bill is the Cropland Adjustment Program. We have learned the wisdom in recent years of diverting land not needed at the present to new uses or for conservation purposes.

The Cropland Adjustment Program will provide land adjustment contracts for as long as ten years. By the end of four years, it is hoped that around 40 million acres will be under contract, with proper safeguards so that no single county or area will be decimated of its farms, thus endangering the economy of that area through loss of farm purchasing power.

These contracts will be less costly and will enable t he farmer to make his plans for the future. In addition, the program will make land more readily available for new uses, particularly for outdoor recreation and beautification. This new agriculture program recognizes that the marketplace is the best mechanism to determine the flow and pace of commercial farming, Most farm products will no longer move in domestic and world markets at artificially high prices. Instead, they will be guided by conditions of supply and demand. At the same time, farmers will be protected from depressed incomes by the payments received for cooperation in diverting acreage to uses other than usual crop production.

Our new program will provide the flexibility necessary to keep pace with a dynamic and changing agriculture. For the majority of farm families in America it brings closer than ever the goal of an income that will enable them to remain on the land. I know the program will receive the support it deserves here in Iowa. For what you are achieving in this state . . . the Johnson Administration is achieving for all America.

We see the Great Society not as a welfare state, but as a state of opportunity. While the majority of Americans are making the most of their abilities -enjoying the highest standard of living in man's history -- there are still far too many Americans living without that opportunity.

X That is why we are engaged in the only noble war mankind has ever waged -- against the forces of ignorance, hunger and disease.
