REMARKS OF VICE PRESIDENT HUBERT HUMPHREY
AT CAMP CATOCTIN JOB CORPS CONSERVATION

CENTER -- December 17, 1965

I am especially happy to be able to come to
Camp Catoctin and personally wish you a very
Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

At this time of year we like to exchange gifts.
I would like to do that with you--I have a small
present for each of you, but I also want to ask
for one in return.

My gifts are three wonderful books that together
contain much of the history of our country and
our particular brand of democracy which has worked
so well.

For this blessing of democratic government we can all give thanks at this time of year.

One book is entitled "We The People"--and it tells the history and traditions of the U. S. Capitol and the great Congress of the United States which it houses. *Repres. Hous. & we strengthen it now.*

Another presents the history of the White House and its illustrious occupants--the Presidents of the United States.

The third is written about the Supreme Court of the United States. *our guarantee of Justice, Freedom & Constitutional Govt.*

Each has some of the most beautiful illustrations ever done of these buildings and institutions -- as published by the National Geographic Society.

Finally, I am presenting to Camp Catoctin our country's flag--one which has flown over our nation's Capitol.

These books will be sent to every Job Corps enrollee in America. I feel that the wonderful story they tell should be known by all of you-- and indeed by every American.

A flag which has flown over the Capitol will also be sent to each Job Corps Center.

Now I want to ask a Christmas present of you.

--A Christmas present for me and for President Johnson.

Those of us who have worked so long and so hard to provide this opportunity are counting on you--and we have great faith in you.

∟ All you do here may not be fun--hard work and accomplishment rarely are. ∟ But if you will stick it out through these difficult times, I promise you the rewards will be greater than you can now imagine.

∟ Again, let me wish you a very Merry Christmas.

And let me wish you a Happy New Year--a year
filled with such personal growth and development that
you will be able to greet each succeeding New Year
with increasing joy and prosperity.
