Meeting -- March 3, 1966

Opening Statement by the Vice President

Gentlemen --

I have asked that we get together today so that we might <u>exchange information and opinions</u> regarding the impact of the Fiscal 1967 budgets on our space programs, present and future. We may well soon have <u>another</u> <u>session</u> dealing with the longer run impact but it is almost impossible to assess the present without revealing some of the future effects of budget changes.

I did not ask you to come to give a <u>detailed rundown</u> on your Fiscal 1967 budgets. Rather, I urge you to direct your remarks to the major <u>problem</u> areas -- the major changes in previous plans -- the major import of the difference between what you had originally asked for space and what the President's budget requests.

Before entering into the discussion, I would make a few brief points:

1. The <u>overall space budget</u>, including that of your agencies as well as of the Weather Bureau and the National Science Foundation, is down about <u>3.8%</u> from what was appropriated for Fiscal 1966. In fact, it is less than for any year since Fiscal 1963. I am sure you would agree, however, that the significant thing is not so much the percentage cut but the way in which such a decrease is distributed.

2. It is my firm belief that these cuts in no sense reflect any <u>decreased interest in or evaluation of the</u> <u>importance</u> of the national space program. <u>Rather</u>, such cuts reflect <u>realities</u> -- military, political, and economic -of the war in Vietnam.

3. This slight downward direction in funding, which I hope can be <u>temporary</u>, is undertaken at a time when the <u>USSR is stepping up</u> its space pace. I hasten to add that I do <u>not</u> think that their rate of activity should determine ours, but I do think that we dare <u>not</u> <u>ignore</u> for even a moment what they are doing or how fast they are doing it.

4. Also, I would like to get your views as to how your space budgets will be <u>received by the Congress</u> this year. The Congress is, as you know, an arena in which I have had some experience and where I might be of some help. I know they are going to look sharply at any apparent waste or duplication as well as any respects in which we may not be measuring up to our competition. I know also that for many this is an election year, and that cannot be overlooked. So, I urge you to express your views frankly in this regard.

First, I would like to call on the Department of Defense so that we might hear what the impact of the Fiscal 1967 budget is on their space activities.
