We expect the programs in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act alone to put 1.2 billion dollars into education during this first year of its operation and 1.4 billion in the second.

It authorizes grants to school districts in approximately test nee 95 per cent of the nation's counties. ______ The Act and includes grants for school libraries and textbooks and for supplementary education services. Another provision authorizes the Office of Education to step up the improvement of teaching methods through research and development activities. Experts from all parts of the country have been involved in the planning of the national program of Regional Educational Laboratories the largest single effort under this authority,

Developmental contracts for nine such laboratories, in different parts of the country, were approved and announced on March 1. These laboratories will, we hope, develop many new ideas and test them out in practice.

In these and other new or expanded education wave programs, we seek to strengthen -- not weaken -- the requires traditional local control of our schools. We seek to help advances you meet the needs of your own community.
