John Muir, one of our great naturalists, once said:

"The forests of America, however slighted by man, must have been a great delight to God; for they were the best he ever planted".

timber can be saved from almost any calamity -- except from the hands of fools.

And they are right.

We have learned some bitter lessons. We have learned that the incredible natural resources of this country are neither limitless nor self-perpetuating if they are abused.

The men who brought night to the Cumberlands were thoughtless destruction of forests and good land came quickly and easily. But repairing this damage . . . replanting and recultivating -these are long-term, complex programs we pay a deal with the have not always been kind or wise in caring for our natural resources. But we are today determined to rebuild and replant and replace the rich bounties that are part of our American birthright. Today, we are a nation of builders. We are working not only to reclaim our precious natural resources, but also our human resources. And nowhere is this work more inspiring than right here in West Virginia. Emphasis on Education

we must continue to create a climate conducive to the development of private enterprise and capital investment. This means new roads and schools, hospitals and community facilities. It means programs to educate your children, administer to your sick and elderly, and provide incentives and opportunities for those who have had little reason to hope for better days. We must continue to expand local initiative 🗕 🌡 designing and implementing partnership with government Today there are thousands of new leaders in communities throughout your state. They are men and women serving on community action boards -- people who previously have gone unrecognized, unheard, unheeded.

Depth of they meet consult and make decisions along with bankers labor leaders and public officials.

And, as you know, the Economic Development Administration will only make technical assistance and development grants to communities that have designed and implemented their own development programs.

Third, We must develop the economic potentials of localities that have been neglected and forgotten for too long.

Let me emphasize: The work of economic developmen is a matter of close cooperation between private enterprise and the federal government -- working together with state and local authorities.

Administration does not intend to supplant private enterprise or local initiative -- we believe in both and are working to strengthen them.

Nor do we intrude where we are not wanted: Economic development loans are made available only after a community is eligible, requests participation, and independently produces a detailed blueprint for future growth to realize its potential for new industry and new jobs.

Progress is not all factories or production. One of the results of our past growth is more leisure time, more mobility and a society increasingly urbanized and suburbanized.

Lone of our national needs is for a pause that refreshes. West Virginia can answer that need.

The world is watching to see if we -- the nation of aceful, democratic -- can achieve what those who peaceful, democratic preach violent, totalitarian revolution have only been able to promise.

Throughout the world, men want jobs and dignity. They want schools for their children and food and medical care for their families.

They want the chance to show what they can do...to go as far as their abilities take them.

They want a life that is full and free and useful.

President Johnson has said that in our own country, condictions of poverty can and must be righted and that, in this generation, they will be righted.

West Virginia has always led the nation in responding to calls to battle. This was true in 1914 and 1941. It was true during the Korean conflict. And it is true today in the conflict in Vietnam.

West Virginia is also leading us in another call to arms -- against the forces that block the way toward social and economic progress.

I have no doubt about your future.

You are fighting the good fight to win a new era of social and economic progress.

We stand with you. And we shall not be satisfied until that progress is achieved.
