what they would like us to do instead, the only answer they've got is "Just stop whatever it is you're doing now and maybe the problems will go away."

Well, the problems won't go away. And most of them won't take "No" for an answer.

Can there be anything more important to a divilized of nation than the care and respect it shows for its senior citizens when their working days are past?

Thirty years ago, the Democratic Administration was trying to give this country Social Security. And the Republicans were trying in every way they knew how, to keep the Social Security bill from even coming to a vote in the Louse. And when it did come to a vote in the they voted 4 to 1 against it.

I believe that the choice you face this fall

- -- The party that moves ahead or the party that procrastinates;
- -- the party of hope or the party of fear.

When you make your choice, judge America by the life you seek not only for yourselves but for your children and your children's children. Judge the problems that face America -and judge which party is prepared to meet those problems. Our nation has big problems ahead -- not the petty, partisan problems the Republicans worry about In the 34 years left of this century, we must make a new America -- build as many cities, as many schools and hospitals and parks and playgrounds as in all the years since the Pilgrims landed. Within the next decade we must double the capacity of our colleges.

We must modernize our city hospitals and extend a nationwide network of clean and comfortable nursing homes for our elderly.

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We must build an urban transportation system so that the worker gets to his job in less time than it takes to fly to California.

We must find ways to dispose of the mountains of poisonous waste that each day pollutes the air we breathe and the water we drink.

But your Federal Government needs Governors and legislatures as working partners in building a better America.
