dence that we celebrate the epic achievement of Christopher Columbus in the Capital of our nation, named the Columbus, toruga Ari District of Columbia.

Some of you may have attended Columbia University.

In our own hemisphere is the Republic of Colombia, a reminder that Spanish-speaking America rightly shares with pride the immortal deeds of this great explorer.

Our school children sing with joy, "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean."

The New World is indeed the gem Columbus

found in his search for a new passage to the treasures of India.

It was one of our literary giants, Theodore

Dreiser, who said: "I had a feeling that somehow the

spirit of Italy was like that of America, and that

somehow there is a close kinship between us and Italy,

and that it was not for nothing that an Italian dis
covered America."

VISIT TO ITALY

I sensed this <u>spirit</u> during my most recent visit to Rome and to Florence in the spring, and we all felt it during the recent visit of your esteemed President Saragat. By gathering here today we honor not only the great navigator, but we reaffirm the bonds of friendship which have so long united our two peoples.

So, I am pleased and honored to accept the Columbus Medal. I look upon it as a symbol of a long

and fruitful association between our two countries.

ITALY AND AMERICA

The Italian nation is very dear in the minds and hearts of all Americans. Millions of our citizens are linked to Italy through ties of blood. All Americans are bound to Italy by bonds of a common civilization which flowered on Italian soil. In addition, we share together a mutual aspiration and a common objective which is a just and lasting world peace.

when we think of your great nation, Mr. Ambassador, we are reminded of the words of Longfellow who said that "Italy remains to all—the land of dreams and visions of delight." In addition, she remains for us today a staunch and steadfast friend, and a valued ally.

SMITHSONIAN

It is very appropriate that at this particular location we honor the 475th Anniversary -- tomorrow -- of Columbus' landing. The Smithsonian Institution symbolize man's boundless quest for knowledge, his

unceasing desire to express himself.

And here we see a magnificent flag which symbolizes America's dedication to the ideal cherished by Italians, too -- freedom.

AMERICA'S WARS

From our Revolutionary War onward, ItalianAmericans have distinguished themselves on the field
of battle. We remember Colonel Francis Vigo (Veego),
who helped win one of our great victories in the struggle for independence, leading to our possession of the
Northwest Territory.

Italian-Americans like Joseph Lametti fought in the War of 1812 when the Flag in this Hall was seen "through the rockets' red glare."

In the War Between the States, members of
the 39th New York Infantry, known as the Garibaldi
Guard, flew the proud banner which had advanced with the
patriot, Garibaldi, in the battle for Rome. On that
banner were Garibaldi's immortal words "God and the People."

From ancient Rome to modern Rome, a long series of great Italians have enriched the history of mankind:

In music from Verdi (Vairdee) to Toscanini

(Tahskaneenee); in literature, Dante (Dontee); in

invention, Marconi, in medicine, in the arts -- countless

Yes, in the White House-- a President whose mother's maiden name was Fitzgerald but who was-he recalled -- descended from a Venetian family, the Geraldinis -- John Fitzgerald Kennedy.

SCIENCE

And who can forget that one of the greatest scientific achievements of our era was ushered in by the superb work of Enrico Fermi. In December, 1942, when his atomic experiment in Chicago succeeded with a chain reaction, a coded telephone message was relayed to Washington; it said, "The Italian Navigator has landed in the New World."
