PRESIDENT, AND YOUR CHARMING WIFE, TOGETHER WITH YOU R FAMILY, THE FOREIGN MINISTER OF MEXICO OUR GOOD FRIEND ANTONIO C FLORES, AND OTHER DISTINGUISHED OF YOUR PARTY -WE ARE GREATLY HONORED TO HAVE WITH US THE PRESIDENT OF THAT THRIVING MODERN NATION TO THE SOUTH, WHOSE BORDER RUNS WITH OURS FOR TWO THOUSAND MILES FROM THE CARIBBEAN TO THE PACIFIC OCEAN. THIS BORDER HAS NOT MADE US RIVALS FOR POWER IN THIS HEMISPHERE, BUT GOOD NEIGHBORS.

MEXICO IS TODAY HIGHLY ESTEEMED THROUGHOUT THE HEMISPHERE AND THROUGHOUT THE WORLD BECAUSE IT HAS ACHIEVED A SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC REVOLUTION IT HAS SUCCEEDED TO A REMARKABLE DEGREE IN INTEGRATING INTO SOCIETY MEN AND WOMEN OF ALL CLASSES, ALL RACES AND ALL AREAS OF THE NATION. 2.

LONG BEFORE THE ALLIANCE FOR PROGRESS WAS LAUNCHED IN 1961, MEXICANS WERE ACTING ON THE PREMISE THAT MAN CAN SHAPE HIS ENVIRONMENT; THAT RADICAL IMPROVEMENT IN THE CONDITION OF ORDINARY PEOPLE CAN BE ACHIEVED THROUGH DELIBERATE SYSTEMATIC POLITICAL ACTION.

MEXICO DEMONSTRATED THAT A GOVERNMENT THAT SUCCEEDS IN MEETING THE BASIC SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC NEEDS OF THE MAJORITY OF THE

PEOPLE NEED NOT FEAR REVOLUTION FROM WITHIN NOR SUBVERSION FROM ABROAD. BY SO DOING, MEXICO HAS MANAGED TO ACHIEVE A TRUE INDEPENDENCE -- WHILE REMAINING A GOOD NEIGHBOR TO THE OTHER NATIONS OF THE HEMISPHERE, WHILE PARTICIPATING AS AN ACTIVE MEMBER OF THE INTER-AMERICAN SYSTEM, SHE HAS ENJOYED CORRECT RELATIONS WITH ALL, BUT IS DEPENDENT ON NONE, MUCH OF THE CREDIT FOR THESE ACCOMPLISH-MENTS IS DUE THE MAN WE HONOR HERE TODAY, PRESIDENT DIAZ-ORDAZ.

MAY OUR TWO COUNTRIES CONTINUE TO SHARE THROUGH THE YEARS THE WARMTH OF UNDERSTANDING AND GENEROSITY OF SPIRIT WHICH THE FIRST FAMILY OF MEXICO BRINGS TO US TODAY.

I ASK YOU TO JOIN ME IN DRINKING A TOAST TO THE PRESIDENT OF MEXICO.
