Yes, we have some serious problems: inequity for
our farmers in our generally prosperous economy...
inadequate schools for too many of our children...cities
and neighborhoods that are less than we want them to be.

Mental Health Centers... New G. I. Bill of Rights... Two new Cabinet Departments... A Treaty for the Peaceful Use of Outer Space... Civil Rights Act of 1964 ...

Water Pollution and Air Pollution Control...Auto Highway Safety...Law Enforcement Assistance Act...an increase in the minimum wage and in Social Security.

↳ That is a brilliant record.

But you and I know that people -- long accustomed to Democratic progress-as-usual -- don't vote for yesterday. They vote for tomorrow.

↳ Many applaud the gains of the last few years -- particularly the people who needed them most.

↳ But tomorrow is what counts to the voter, and that's as it should be.

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L The Democratic agenda is different. You heard it in the President's State of the Union Message:

- a manpower program to wipe out hard-core unemployment;
- a sixfold increase in the rate of low and middle income housing construction over the next decade;
- a child health program;
- increased consumer protection;
- drug control, to "stop the sale of slavery to the young;"

-- a study of the auto insurance system that is largely responsible for the torrent of litigation that delays justice in America.

L Now I want to say a few words about another very important item on that Democratic agenda -- first class treatment for the American farmer and his community.

Farmer

2 Farmers are going to have to bargain for that position in our society. ~~They deserve to bargain.~~ They need to bargain. And this administration intends to see that they can bargain.

It was with that need in mind that we made a fundamental change in support loan policy, for instance, to enable more farmers to maintain control of their grain until they choose to sell it.

But we need more. And as President Johnson pledged in this State of the Union Message, he intends to recommend a security commodity reserve to protect the market from price-depressing stocks that would undercut bargaining power. He is also pledged, in his words, "to recommend programs to help farmers bargain more effectively for fair prices."

Rural America

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Those programs are going to need your support.

And let me emphasize that this is not a question of farm prices alone.

It goes to the heart of economic and social development in rural America.

It has to do with schools that provide an up-to-date education...homes that offer all the modern conveniences that America so abundantly produces...jobs...a rural environment that is a satisfactory alternative for every American who does not choose to live in the city.

Yes, we want a better, safer, freer America. And we are prepared to build toward that ideal knowing full well that the path ahead will be rough, and that our task, in our growing, changing society may never be done.

But let us also recognize now that America can never be entirely free or safe until freedom from want and safety from aggression are a greater reality for all nations of the world.

The obligations of world leadership which history has thrust upon us cannot be escaped in this nuclear age.

The past progress made by Franklin Roosevelt, Harry Truman, John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson cannot be cashed in today for a retreat from responsibility.

Nor can we mortgage the hopes of the future to the doubts of the present.

Security and development at home...security and development abroad are a single challenge -- one and inseparable.

I believe this nation has the power, the wealth,
the endurance and the courage to meet that challenge --
and to go on meeting it as long as it remains before us.

As President Johnson said in his State of the
Union Message:

"If ever there was a nation that was capable
of solving its problems, it is this nation.

"If ever there were a time to know the
pride and excitement and the hope of being an
American, it is this time."

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
