Con Sunday night President Johnson extended the hand of peace to North Vietnam in a way designed to bring about prompt and productive negotiations.

In another dimension of peace, I was privileged in Mexico City to sign on behalf of our government a treaty removing the threat of

Intensive preparations are under way to assure that the Olympics of 1968 will be a success. I am sure you know that I was saddened by President Johnson's announcement that he will not seek re-election. He had informed me of his decision.
