Thank you, too, Mr. President (to LBJ), for so often taking the words right out of my mouth. My new bowl already runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life --- But I guess I better leave out that part about dwelling in the House of my Lord.

I express my appreciation and gratitude, too, for this evening's entertainment -- all except that fellow who kept dropping his H-H-H's. (Reference is to "Sir Gilbert Peake".)

I'm not sure, Chuck (referring to Chuck Bailey) what kind of home talent show we can put together next year. It's going to be a big come down from a television disc jockey to a drug-store soda jerk.

My remarks this evening will be brief.

I am aware of the current definition of an optomist: A woman in the audience who starts putting on her shoes when Humphrey says

I have never quite gotten over the notion that a period is a punctuation mark starting another sentence.

When I get started, I'm just too lazy to stop.

You have asked for my reports on the campaign.

I'll have no comment on the Indiana primary until the urinalysis reports (or saliva tests) are in.

The reports of an "adequately-financed" Humphrey campaign this time are a baseless charge of guilt by association -- although I admit I tired of trying to make my living in this business like a free lance astronaut.

Gene McCarthy says there are more important jobs to fill than the Vice-Presidency. I agree with Gene.

The press report of our having to buzz the landing strip in Rawlins, Wyoming, yesterday to get some antelope out of the way was wrong. They were delegates who couldn't wait.

I find the American people ready to agree now that every issue is not black and blue. They believe in this country ... where

every boy can go into politics and grow up to be Vice President. It's just one of those chances he has to take.

But seriously ... (a phrase I got from Everett Dirksen) ...
and "in conclusion..."

You will find, Mr. President (to LBJ), even in all this banter, evidence of a deep affection for you which few people in this country can have as intimate reason for as do all of us here tonight.

I salute you gentlemen and ladies ... White House Correspondents
... in Ambrose Bierce's way -- as "enlightened souls who prefer dry
wine to sweet, sense to sentiment, wit to humor and clean English to
slang."

The months ahead have a special relevance to the democracy's future.

Some of us -- many of us here tonight -- will be joined ... by choice or by assignment ... in the common responsibility during these months to inform a people.

There could be no superior function.

Yet if this responsibility is common ... its proper discharge demands an uncommonly high order of independence -- especially between those who seek roles in the nation stewardship ... and those who report on their efforts.

Freedom ... no less than science .. has its <u>Truths</u>; and they are as hard to get at ... as uncompromising ... only possibly less absolute.

There is that haunting epigram by the Man of La Mancha:
"Facts," he puts it, "are the enemy of Truth." And the dictum
itself seems not fact ... yet still true.

And then his refrain ... about the "duty -- nay the privilege!
"To dream the impossible dream/ To reach the unreachable star!"

No Don Quixotes ... we who politic and you who report.

Seasoned, weathered veterans more ... of the view that "politics is the art of the possible."

Yet ... just conveivably ... the art of the possible dream -- and of the reachable star.

I also want the relationship between government and those who report on government to be free of sharp practice by either side.

This relationship is too important to our free nation and to our free press to allow of anything but open and plain and consistent policies and habits. This means providing full and fair access to all the information available to the government whose release does no damage to national security.

I want every journalist to have equal opportunity to report this news. I do not want procedures that are unfair, that confuse the public, that invite opinion into news columns and bring worse practices in their wake.

Moynihan/Bennett May 9, 1963 White House Correspondents

Sometimes it is necessary for the government to offer information to the press without fully revealing the source. This is a strategem that has been used too often. I want it reserved only for those rare occasion when there are no acceptable alternatives. In short, I want fairer treatment for the public and for those journalists who cannot report stories on their own say-so or on the say-so of some anonymous source.

News without a source is bad enough. News without a source offered exclusively to one or to a few selected journalists is intolerable. The result of such "leaks" are "planted" stories that are demeaning to both journalism and government.

I could end with the familiar comment Thomas

Jefferson made on preferring the absence of government to

the absence of newspapers, but I would rather remind you

that Jefferson also said newspapers could be divided into

four chapters, Truth, Possibilities, Probabilities and Lies.

"The first chapter," wrote Jefferson would be very short."

It is as much my job as it is yours to make that chapter longer.
