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MERVYN DYMALLY: Ladies and gentlemen, may I have your attention. I wish to present to you the wife of the Vice-President of the United States, Mrs. Hubert H. Humphrey.

MRS. HUMPHREY: You know, I have just been asked to say hello and give my greetings to you, and to tell you how happy we are to be here in Los Angeles. I am a little guilty, because it is a little difficult to follow my husband and to have him listen to my words. I want to tell you how happy I am in these two days meeting various groups and organizations all over the state. People have asked me, "Why are you out campaigning again?" or "Do you like campaigning?"

First of all, I do. The reason I do is because I have such a wonderful husband to campaign for.

(Applause.)

You see, he isn't really supposed to be listening. It may go to his head. But the reason that I like to campaign for him is because I would like for you to know the hard work and goals that he has set for all of us, the things that he has stood for, the bills that he has seen get passed, and the things that he stands for makes it easy for me to campaign for him.

So, with that, I just want to say again, thanks for coming out, and any help that you can give me and help me to campaign for my husband, I will appreciate.

(Applause.)

MERVYN DYMALLY: Now, ladies, the next President of the United States, Hubert H. Humphrey.

(Applause.)

VICE-PRESIDENT HUMPHREY: Senator Dymally, and my good friends, let me tell you how difficult it is to speak following Mrs. Humphrey. We are very happy, both of us, to be here in your company, and you have truly honored us by your presence, by your willingness to come and share this social hour with us.

I want to express to each and every one of you very quickly and very sincerely my personal thanks for your support, those of you who have supported us, for your friendship, those of you who have blessed us with many precious gifts of friendship, and those of you who will give us a helping hand.

You know, I am fully aware of the fact that no man in public life really gets any place, or gets to his goal, whatever that goal may be, without the help of the public.

Senator Dymally and I were talking last night about how we got started in our respective careers of public life. Each one of us knows that you have got to help somebody else. That is the way you get there.

Now, I now seek this high office which is in a very real sense your office. I am only a trustee. The presidency does not belong to the President; it belongs to the people, and I seek to make this office belong to more

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and more people. Frankly, some people haven't had much claim on that office. What we are trying to do together is to see to it that people who have never been privileged to hold a claim, so to speak, on that office, and in realistic terms of that claim, I want to be your representative in the presidency. I want to represent all the people of this country, not just some of the people; not just the white community, but the black community; and not just the black community, but the white community. I want to represent everybody with the sense of clear purpose that you would like to have if you were there in that high office, and that is really what my goal is in public life. Public life is a life of service. I have been talking to your representatives and some of them are here in the City Council that are here with you this evening, and your supervisors, and members of your state legislature, and you have elected some very wonderful people. I know that their satisfaction comes out of the achievements in the field of legislation, or administration, that affects the lives of the people that they represent, and that is my satisfaction, too. It is the satisfaction of knowing that maybe after you have fulfilled your term of service, you have helped somebody else, and in doing so, of course, you make it better for yourself.

Now, I want to thank in particular Dr. Woods for serving as the co-chairman of my nationwide committee of the Women for Humphrey. I sure must say that I did make a

good selection.

(Applause.)

I appreciate so much here the representatives of Congress. Congressman Hawkins is here with us today. Your two state senators are here, Senator Dymally and Senator Dills. I don't know whether Billy Greene is with us here or not, but he was with us. I appreciate the members of the City Council that are here. We have just so many that are here to help us today, and can I leave you with one final thought. If you believe in me and what I stand for, then tell your neighbors and tell your friends. This is going to be a hard-fought campaign. I think this campaign is at the crossroads -- I really do -- as to whether or not we are going to tread water for a while, so to speak, and ultimately slip back, or whether or not we are going to break out into the open, and maybe open up this society for the people.

There is so much talent in America that is yet untapped; so many good people that have yet not had a chance; so much to do in America for the people that want to do things, and I want to help you, and I want you to help me. I know we can do it. I know that we can make as great a breakthrough in the future of America in the year 1968 as some of us did back in 1948 when we were at the Democratic convention. We stood up there and fought hard to get that political party, as I said, to walk out of the shadows of

I know that we can do it.

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(Applause.)

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If we will just pull together, we will get the job done. I want to pull with you, not against you, and I want you to know that I am ready to do anything I can do to get this job done.

states' rights into the bright sunshine of human rights.

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Some of you were a little worried and came to me today and said, "It is too bad that we had a little fracas last night." That is par for the course. I told a group of professors today that I had more commotion than that on college campuses. It didn't bother me one little bit. What bothers me is when people are not interested. I want people to be interested, and I am going to put my faith in the leaders of this community. In this room today there are leaders from every part of the black community, every part of it, and if we just stick together, there isn't any power on this earth that can stop us from fulfilling what is the destiny of this country, which is an equal opportunity and a fair chance without any regard to all the false standards. without any regard to race, color or creed. We will get the job done.


