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TALKING POINTS FOR THE VICE PRESIDENT

Women for Humphrey Luncheon August 1, 1968

Participation and Involvement -- the key to success for all crucial governmental undertakings in the next Administration. And this theme--expressed in the concept of an <u>Open Presidency</u> in an open society--is especially relevant for American women.

A. The cliche that American women are the most discriminatedagainst <u>majority</u> in history is true.



B. The next President must answer this question: <u>How do we</u> <u>unleash the vast reservoirs of untapped female talent and ability in</u> <u>the urgent business of saving the American democratic experiment?</u>

C. Federal government as model for others to follow -- and that means <u>opening</u> up all aspects of the Federal establishment to women--Presidential appointments -- merit appointments -- advisory councils -- and even the White House staff. Any applicants?

This means an entirely new approach--looking beyond the Federal positions "reserved" for women.

D. This means thinking <u>creatively</u> about how women's talents are <u>undeveloped</u> and <u>underutilized</u> in this society--and what we can do to correct these deficiencies.

-What policies can make it more feasible for women to lead several careers in one lifetime?

- How can the Federal government use the special talents of women to the fullest? For example, in the consumer field how can <u>women power</u> be fully mobilized to implement new legislation now on the books...to suggest additional legislation and executive action ?

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-What creative roles can women play in foreign policy How do we break down old barriers and traditions which severely handicap a woman's career in the foreign service? -How can the Federal, State, and local governments help give women the freedom they need to participate fully in

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the activities of their communities  $\mathcal{L}^{\text{day care centers for}}$  low and middle-income families.

E. <u>Women for Humphrey</u> can, hopefully, do more than normal political assignments and volunteer work. <u>Every local organization</u> <u>should also have at least one community-service project-just as a</u> group of Businessmen for Humphrey donated play streets for children in Harlem.

F. These are the questions you can help answer for me and, more importantly, you can tell me the right questions to ask. And let me ask you another question — Do you think America is ready for a woman Vice Presidential candidate?

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## Women's Strengthened Commitment to the Meeting of Human Need

The lives of American women have changed more rapidly during the past two or three decades than in any comparable period of history.

Today half of all women between the ages of 18 and 65 are in the **Liver** force. A very large percentage of these women and a still larger percentage of those not gainfully employed give generously of their time as volunteers in every type of community service and activity. Women are active participants; spectatorship on the sidelines is passe. There has never been a time when women have been more actively concerned with the shaping of social and economic change. They are new more committed to the essential goals of the democratic process

One only needs to look at the stated objectives of the national organizations in which the great majority of American women are now to be counted, to see the depth and range of this commitment. Their leadership and the effective majority of their memberships are in the front lines seeking to help end poverty, to eliminate racial and all other forms of discrimination, to improve our social welfare policies and practices, to rebuild the slums, improve our schools and expand health services. They have thoroughly grasped the concept that investment in people pays not only in human terms but in economic terms

as well.

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Organizations which only a few years ago hesitated to support minimum wage legislation as being too daring now firmly include in their platforms support for basic income assurance. They are strongly pledged to consumer programs which only a short time back found relatively little support. They are not just talking; they are ready to accept responsibility. This mood is expressed strongly and clearly in organization publications and at national, State and local meetings.

One national woman's organization, some 3 million members strong, is quite typical of most when it says: "Women across the land are seeking consciously and unconsciously ways to participate in the crucial struggles of mankind." We "must provide this opportunity and enlist this potential leadership. Imagination and daring are required to translate our purpose and priorities into an invitation to commitment. . . . We can only live these changes; we cannot think our way to humanity. Every one of us, and every group with which we live and work, must become the model of the era which we desire to create. . . . Our freedom and power are determined by our willingness to accept responsibility for the future."

Those who have the opportunity to work with women throughout the country are convinced that ever increasing numbers will lend their vigorous support to those who sound a strong call for the specific programs needed to create the kind of tomorrow they want for their children.
