VICE PRESIDENT HUMPHREY CHALLENGES NIXON ON LAW AND ORDER STAND

Stratford, Conn., October 18 -- Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said today that Richard Nixon talks about law and order but, if elected, "he won't get the job done."

Speaking at the Avco Manufacturing plant, Humphrey said that he had proposed a "comprehensive program of law enforcement, of court reform and prison reform to make our streets safe. I leveled with you. I said it would cost money and that I meant to spend money to get the job done." He stated that Nixon "won't spend the money and he is not going to give you safety and he won't get the job done."

Humphrey accused Nixon of not debating because he doesn't want the American people to know where he stands on the issues. "The worst thing about Mr. Republican,' said Humphrey, "is his record, and he can't hide that." He charged that Nixon has obstructed and voted against every piece of progressive legislation and is now "against keeping atom bombs out of the hands of Castros and Nassers."

Vowing to smoke Nixon out before election day, Humphrey declared that the American people "are not going to elect a man President when they don't know where he stands."

I have a good feeling here in Gonnecticut. I think we're going to win this one.

My Republican opponent has stood in the shadows throughout this campaign.

He has refused to speak out on the vital issues --

He's full of catchwords and caveats -- but I think the American people deserve answers.

And I'm going to smoke Mr. Nixon out.

I can understand why he might be debate-shy, considering his last experience with John F. Kennedy.

But for eight years he's been writing and saying that debates are a good thing -- that the public has a right to know. Now suddenly he's changed his mind.

Is he afraid?

Is he hiding something?

The worst thing about Mr. Republican is his record, and he can't hide that -a tangled wreckage of obstructionism and defeat --- against Medicare...against federal
aid to education...against test ban treaties, and now against keeping atom bombs
out of the hands of Castros and Nassers.

What else is there that he doesn't want to talk about? Those private letters to Wall Street?

Or is he so sure he's going to win that he doesn't think it matters to the American people what he thinks?

Let me tell you this: the American people don't like being taken for granted,

I think Mr. Republican's enthusiasm gap is rapidly developing into a credibility gap.

I predict that he's going to wake up on November sixth feeling just about the way Tom Dewey did in 1948.

There are more people in America than Mr. Nixon has dollars in his advertising budget. And those people are not going to elect a man President when they don't
know where he stands...and they should not.

You know where I stand:

I've spoken to the nation Vietnam.

Last Saturday I spelled out my comprehensive program of law enforcement, of court reform and prison reform to make our streets safe.

I leveled with you. I said it would cost money and that I meant to spend money to get the job done.

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Mr. Nixon won't spend the money...and he is not going to give you safety...
and he won't get the job done.

Medicare...Social Security...education...cities...pollution...you know where I stand this year. And you know where I and the Democratic Party have stood in the past.

That is why most of the people in Connecticut are Democrats,

That is why there's going to be a Democratic victory in November.

Let us be perfectly clear about this: a vote for the Republicans on November 5 -- or a vote for Mr. Wallace -- which will amount to the same thing -- can be a pretty expensive vote.

Just last week Mr. Nixon's chief economic advisor came out in favor of higher unemployment. He says it's good for the economy.

I hope his job is the first to go.

Higher unemployment? Throwing people out of work? You've heard that kind of economics before -- it's the same old formula that produced three Republican recessions in the 1950's.

And Bridgeport and Stratford know what Republican mismanagement and recession means.

First the overtime goes.

The paychecks get smaller.

The mortgages and car payments get harder to meet.

Next the production lines slow down.

Then they stop completely.

You can vote Republican. You can vote Wallace...if you like long vacations ...unpaid vacations.

Is that what you want?

Do you think the American people will buy that?

Can America afford it?

Never ... and you know it.

But I shall be a full-employment President too.

What about education? Six hundred thousand American rengsters went to college last year because of federal loans, grants, and scholarships. Some of them were your kids.

The Republicans have been against those programs from the start. If they get elected, will your child have a chance to go to college?

And what about that Southern strategy Mr. Nixon is running? Does it mean help for run-away plants to move down to Strom Thurmond's South Caroline...and when George Wallace promises tax incentives to relocate plants in rural areas -- you know what he means.

He's talking about these plants -- and he's talking about your jobs.

Our journey began more than 200 years ago.

We came to this country burning with the idea that one man was as good as another...that what was wrong could be made right...that people possessed the basic wisdom and goodness to govern themselves without conflict.

Now we come to a new moment of crisis in that journey.

We are called:

- -- to heal the hatreds and divisions among us;
- -- to reaffirm the basic decency of spirit which lies within us as a people.
- -- to reassert this nation's moral leadership in a world that desparately seeks that leadership;
- -- to tell a new generation that what we have is good...that it is worth saving...that the dream of their parents is still a worthy dream.

This is work for all of us.

I seek to work through the Presidency of the United States.

I do not have a massive advertising budget. I do not have a multi-million dollar TV blitz. I only have you. Millions of people against millions of dollars. Let's break through Mr. Nixon's smokescreen. And let's break through to a New Day for the American people.

### REMARKS OF VICE-PRESIDENT HUMPHREY AVCO PLANT BRIDGEPORT, CONNECTICUT FRIDAY, OCTOBER 18, 1968

VICE-PRESIDENT HUMPHREY: Thank you, thank you very much. Thank you very much, Governor Dempsey. Thank you, Mayor Curran. And Richard Lee.

Congressman Don Irwin, Congressman Bob Giaimo, Congressman John Monagan, who is not here with us, I believe, but has constituents here. And my good friend, the distinguished Senator from the State of Connecticut, Abe Ribicoff, Senator Ribicoff.

(Applause and boos)

Abe, I want to tell you, when I hear a sound like that, I am always reminded of what a Sioux Indian once told me. I hears somebody say when they said boo in Sioux that means three cheers for Ribicoff.

(Applause)

And when they say it about Humphrey, it means four cheers for Humphrey.

(Applause)

You have honored us today by your presence here, this wonderful crowd. And I intend to have a few moments with you, to talk about your country this election, the candidates and the parties in this election.

First of all (shouts from audience) but it won't be saved out there.

First of all, I come to Connecticut to talk to a group of people in a state that has made remarkable progress, industrially, politically, economically, and socially.

I come here to talk to you about your country, about this election, and about the candidates. And I am going to get right down to business.

In this campaign, there are three candidates. They -each stands for a particular set of principles. I have sought
during this campaign to be able to get the candidates of the
three parties, the Independent party, the Republican party,
and the Democratic party, to stand on the same platform. I have
thought that it would be a good idea for you, the American
people, who ultimately have to make the decision, you, the jury
of the American people, to hear the candidates speak, and to
hear them speak at the same place, at the same time, under the
same circumstances, before the same audience.

I have challenged my opposition. But the Republican candidate feels so comfortable in his quiet little

hacienda down at Key Biscayne, he feels so confident of the results of this election, that he feels that he can take you for granted, that he doesn't have to worry about the outcome of this election, nor does he have to speak up on the issues.

But I happen to believe that the American people should not be taken for granted. I think you are entitled to know where we stand. I think you are entitled to know how we think. I think you are entitled to hear us speak on the issues. And I ask the Republican candidate, just as I asked the third party candidate, to come forth and to join us in nationwide debate, so that the American people can hear us talk.

(Applause)

The question -- the question comes -- the question comes what are they afraid of? That is the question. The question comes, why is it that the Republican nominee is unwilling to debate. And I think I can tell you. And I think that people in this audience, that want to think through their problems, will understand why.

Every person in this audience is interested in his economic well-being. Every person in this audience can remember days when it wasn't quite like it is now. Every person in Connecticut can remember Republican days when there were fewer jobs, when there were lower salaries, when there was unemployment, and when there were all kinds of difficulties. And may I say that those days did not help the State of Connecticut, nor did they help the United States of America, nor did they help the people that are the breadwinners of their familles.

Mr. Nixon doesn't want me to ask him why he thinks a higher rate of unemployment would be helpful in this country.

Now, I want to ask Mr. Nixon a question.

His economic adviser -- his economic adviser said that he thought that it might be all right if there was a little higher unemployment in this country, in order to have what he called price stability.

I wonder whose job he was talking about. I wonder if he was talking about your job. I wonder if he was talking about your job. Do you want some more unemployment under Mr. Nixon?

(Shouts of "No.")

I didn't think so.

And I must say to this audience -- I must say to this audience that if you want a longer vacation, unpaid, if you want less overtime, if you want fewer jobs, all you need to do is to follow the old-fashioned economics, and you will get it. That is what we are talking about. We are talking about the education of your family, too. We are talking about schools. And we are talking about law

and order. And we are talking about health. We are talking about our families. And every one of these matters is at stake in this election.

Now, let me just say one other thing. There is another candidate in this election. I saw somebody out here carrying a sign for him. Well, may I say that I think that is just fine. And I want to talk a little bit about that other candidate, because if there ever was -- if there ever was a counterfeit candidate in terms of program and policy, it is that man.

(Applause and boos)

Now, let us get down to brass tacks -- let us get down to talk about some sense.

Here is the candidate of the third party that has the unmitigated gall to come before an audience and say that he is for law and order -- for law and order.

(Applause)

Let us see what kind of law and order he has got. He was Governor of his state, with supreme power for law and order. And what did he end up with? The highest murder rate of any state inthe Union. What else die he end up with? The second highest aggravated assault rate of any state in the Union. Is that the kind of law and order that you want for America?

(Shouts of "No.")

And what did he do for the police. I see my friends out there in these blue uniforms. He was asked the other day, "What will you do, Mr. Wallace, -- what will you do for the police?" And he said, "I will give them moral support." Well, let me tell you he is a little short of that, too. It takes more than moral support. If you want better police, if you want better protection, if you want safer streets, if you want a safer neighborhood, you are going to have to pay your police, just like youhave to pay for any other excellent service that you want.

(Applause)

And now let us talk about other things. Let us talk about -- "Give 'em hell, Hubert."

(Applause)

Now, let us talk about jobs. Let us talk about economics.

Here is Mr. Wallace -- just a minute -- here is Mr. Wallace, the man that says he is the workers' friend. There won't be -- let me tell you my friends -- the workers' friend for Connecticut -- a man that comes up here and tries to take your factories, a man that is a union buster, a man, it you please, that has the lowest, second lowest wages in any state in the Union. Is that the friend of the workingman?

(Shouts of "No.")

A man, if you please, whose state has the lowest Workmen's Compensation of any state in the Union. Is that a friend of the workingman?

(Shouts of "No.")

A man, if you please, who has a 6 per cent sales tax on everything. Is that a friend of the worker?

(Shouts of "No.")

Ladies and gentlemen, let's face it. It is as phony as a three dollar Confederate bille, and you know it.

(Applause)

And what is it all about?

It is a candidacy that is based upon prejudice, upon fear, upon suspicion, and doubt. It is a candicacy, my friends, that you could not tolerate in this factory. This factory depends upon workers trusting each other. This factory depends upon people being able to work together. And may I say that Mr. Wallace spreads fear and doubt and suspicion. This country of ours — this country of ours cannot survive — cannot survive in racial bigotry, cannot survive, if you please, in division. This country cannot survive divided. This country can survive united.

(Applause)

May I say to the young man that I saw up there -you better be careful, young man, because I want to tell you
that if this country becomes divided on racial lines, it will
be a country that is sad and sick and in tears. This country
must be united. The only thing that can hold this country
together is the pride in our American citizenship, regardless
of race, color or creed.

(Applause)

And let me say to that angry young man that I saw out ther with his white face. It isn't a black man that is going to take your job. It is a Republican administration that will take your job.

(Applause)

And let me say to each group in this audience that if this country ever gets to a point where we cannot live together as an American family, where we cannot live together as friends and neighbors, then there is no hope in this world. This election is going to decide something. We are going to decide whether we can move ahead together, or whether we are going to move back torn apart. We are going to decide in this election whether we dan build a better America for our kids, whether we can build better cities for our people, we are going to decide whether or not we can have one Nation, one Nation — not two — one Nation, under God — not under a demagogue —

one Nation indivisible, not divided -- one Nation with liberty and justice for all. That is what we are going to decide.

(Applause)

My friends, I ask your help. I ask your help.
I come to you today -- I come to you today asking for you to help me in this fight. Not for myself, but for this country. Let me say to those voices that would tear us apart -- you do not harm just yourself -- you harm this last best hope of earth. You do not just speak only to yourself. You speak the words of poison to others. This Nation needs each other as it never needed anybody before. Every time a poor man gets a job, the rich man is the better. Every time an unemployed worker is trained and given a job, the man on the job is that much safer.

Every time that we help each other, we help every-body. And I come to you to tell you that we can do things, we can rebuild our cities, we can -- we can improve our schools, we can help our elderly, we can heal the wounds in this country. And I ask you, dear friends, to listen not to these voices that would tear you apart and divid you -- I ask you to listen to the voice of your conscience -- the conscience of America. And that conscience is right.

(Applause)

So, my friends, I ask you this question.

Do you think that this country would be better off with Wallace and LeMay?

(Shouts of "No.")

Do you think this country would be better off with Nixon and Agnew?

(Shouts of "No.")

Do you think this country would be better off with Humphrey and Muskie?

(Shouts of "Yes" and boos)

I only hope on election day you feel the same way.

Now, my friends, I want you to go from this place today, carry this message. I want you to go out and work. I want you to work for the team of Humphrey and Muskie. And I want you to compare that team (boos and cheers). --

(Applause)

-- and I want those of you that are for us to be as loud in your enthusiasm as the handful that are against us. Now, let's hear ya.

(Applause and cheers)

Let's make up our mind that a noisy few in this

country are not going to run this country. Let's make up our minds that the great majority of the Americans that believe in fair play, that believe in a fair chance, that believe in the promise of America, are going to run this country. I ask for your help on November 5. Thank you.

I want to meet somebody else. I want you to meet -- listen, fellows. You'll even like this one. I want you to meet a very lovely lady. I want you to hear her. She is a lady of the screen, and of the stage, a very talented and wonderful woman. Inger Stevens.
