VICE PRESIDENT HUMPHREY PLEDGES TO GIVE FARM WORKERS RIGHT TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

East Los Angeles, Calif., October 23 -- Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey today renewed his pledge to give farm workers the right to bargain collectively.

Speaking at a rally of Mexican Americans, Humphrey declared that "it is only right for the farm workers of America to organize and bargain collectively to secure their legitimate rights as workers in our free economy." He said that it is up to the federal government to guarantee farm workers that right. Alluding to the current California grape strike, he said "there is no reason for boycott except that every other recourse is foreclosed to the farm workers."

Humphrey cited statistics showing that, among other things, unemployment among Mexican Americans is three times higher than among Anglos and that for every 350 students in California's state universities there is only one Mexican American student. He promised that, as President, he would correct these inequities, saying "I will stand with you every day of my Presidency just as I always have."

He asked his listeners to "stand with me now," emphasizing that California "may very well decide who is President for the next four years."

**\$27-MILLION BUSINESS-GOVERNMENT EFFORT FOR EAST LOS ANGELES
DISADVANTAGED ANNOUNCED BY WIRTZ**

A \$27-million effort featuring 4 private firms expanding their facilities to hire and train 1,660 disadvantaged persons at 2 Los Angeles area sites was announced today by Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz.

Three of the companies will outfit a large, empty lockup -- the Lincoln Heights jail in East Los Angeles -- to employ 1,300 for producing furniture, electronics products and plastics products.

Another firm, Marshall Imports, Inc., will expand its facilities in El Monte to provide jobs for 360 persons in the production of wigs and other items.

It is expected that most of the new employees will be Mexican-Americans under the 2-year contracts.

The Federal Government will invest \$3,225,000 under the Special Impact provisions of the Economic Opportunity Act to cover employment of the 1,660 workers and the 4 firms will put up a total of more than \$23 million.

Each company will make a capital outlay ranging from approximately \$5.8 million to \$6.1 million over the next 5 years to expand its production capabilities and employ the disadvantaged.

The Special Impact program -- already operating in Los Angeles and elsewhere -- is aimed at helping meet critical problems in target urban areas with heavy concentrations of unemployment and underemployment.

The Labor Department is encouraging firms to submit similar proposals to: Manpower Administration, U. S. Department of Labor, Washington, D. C.

The firms which will equip the jail for production are Socoma Companies, Inc., Alhambra, Calif.; Monarch Electronics International, Inc., North Hollywood, Calif., and Barrier, Inc., Sun Valley, Calif.

"Significantly," said Mr. Wirtz, "these projects will provide promising career opportunities for the disadvantaged and the chance to obtain ownership interests in the firms where they work."

He said employers will provide "an orderly progression of the new workers into supervisory-managerial positions" and will devise stock-purchase plans to help the new employees acquire ownership interests.

The new employees, who will work in such jobs as wig color matchers, stylers and strippers, upholsterers, press operators, wood finishers, electronic assemblers and inspectors, will start at \$2.00 an hour wages.

Recruitment for the projects will be handled through the Concentrated Employment Program and the U. S. Employment Service in the area.

The following is a summary of the 4 projects:

-- Marshall Imports, Inc., will hire and train 360 persons at a Federal investment of \$875,000 for producing wigs and other products in El Monte.

Job categories: Stylers, setters, strippers, material-handling assemblers, packers, color matchers, box makers, shippers, office workers and maintenance and rate clerks.

-- Socoma Companies, Inc., will hire and train 650 persons at a Federal investment of \$950,000 for manufacturing and assembling furniture in the Lincoln Heights site.

Job categories: Cutters, packers, transportation personnel, machine and equipment personnel, maintenance men, upholsterers, shipping personnel, press operators, finishers, office workers, pattern makers and boxing assemblers.

-- Monarch Electronics International, Inc., will hire and train 450 persons at a Federal investment of \$800,000 for manufacturing and assembling electronics products in the Lincoln Heights site.

Job categories: Electronic assemblers, supervisors, coil assembling solders, inspectors, finishers, packers, yoke and products specialists, office workers and general maintenance personnel.

-- Barrier, Inc., will hire and train 200 persons at a Federal investment of \$600,000 for manufacturing and assembling plastic products in the Lincoln Heights site.

Job categories: Mold makers, formers, shipping personnel, office workers, assemblers, route operators, welders, form operators, machinists and finishers.
