


I shall be a peace President ... beginning in

Vietnam and continuing with effective controls on the

strategic arms race. And I shall look to all Americans ...

as part of the Open Presidency ... for wisdom ... ideas ...

and support in my effort

As the Prophet Isaiah said: "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace." (Isaiah 52:7)

I That should be America's role in the world.

That will be America's role when I am President.

Second, is the reality of division in American

society ... and the paramount need for a new reconciliation.

The President must understand the temper of our people ... their trials ... their fears ... and the key to unlocking their energies in common purpose.

The President must lead the American people away from divisions and discord ... to a trust in our future as a united people.

The President must inspire us with confidence that our efforts will succeed ... that our unity means a new freedom for each of us, that no man need fear loss when others gain.

And the President must listen to his people ...

listen to the quiet voice as well as to the loud ... listen to the common man as well as to his spokesman and one of us calls in need ... or in confusion ... the President must repend.

If we are to be a united people, the President must serve as a symbol of trust and confidence ... for one nation, and one people.

And there is the third reality of our time ... the reality of stagnation ... or progress ... in the search for human rights ... social justice ... and continued economic prosperity.

In this campaign, I have spoken out for progress, despite warnings that Americans have had enough ... that they want to be let done ... that our people are seeking only ease and security.

I just don't believe it.

I believe that the American people now more than ever, want to press forward in the never-ending struggle for justice, the never-ending search for greatness.

- I believe they are determined ---
- -- that no single child shall go hungry;
- -- that no single child shall be denied good health ...
 an excellent education ... a chance to unlock the door to
 life ... and develop to the limits of his abilities;

- -- that no single family shall live in poverty;
- -- that no one who wants to work shall lack a job at decent wages;
- -- and that no segment of society shall be asked to carry more than its fair share of the burden of our democracy ... and this means thoroughgoing tax reform.

 This also means federal assistance to our cities and suburbs to stop the spiralling local property taxes without cutting back on essential public services such as education and fire and police protection.

You here tonight know which party has led this fight for more than 30 years -- the Democratic Party.

You know, too, that sometimes we Democrats have differed over issues -- because we care, and we care deeply -- about those issues.

Tonight I am happy to report to you that our party is uniting ... that those brave men who led dissent last spring have been listened to ... that they have made their mark on policy ... and that they are coming home.

With their help, with the help of all of you, we are going to win this election.

The hour is late. Only five days remain before election day.

Our road has been uphill.

But we're rolling tonight. And we're going to keep on rolling, right down to the wire.

I urge all of you here tonight, who believe with me... who believe in the ideals of the Democratic Party... to give me your help in this election.

And I urge all the people of Maryland... all the people of Virginia and the District of Columbia and everywhere else ... whatever their political beliefs, to vote on Tuesday.

This election is too important for anyone to stay home.

Voting is always a privilege. This year it is a solemn

duty. America needs each and every one of you -- next

Tuesday, and in the years ahead.

And together we can do it.
