NO - on Ford Stamp plan

- "--- NO to the 1961 Emergency Feed Grain Bill that meant millions of dollars to the Minnesota farmers.
- "--- NO to full funding of the Agricultural Conservation program, which is crucial to the conservation of soil and water in Minnesota.
- "--- NO to the 1962 wheat and feed grain bill which, if passed, would have given farmers the chance to build stronger, income-boosting supply-management programs. Thanks to Republican votes like MacGregor's, the bill and Minnesota farmers suffered.
- "--- NO to the 1963 voluntary feed grain bill which became law over MacGregor's negativism.
- "--- NO to the 1964 Tariff Act amendment which protects livestock producers from the price-depressing effects of unlimited meat imports.
- "--- NO and YES to the Agricultural Act of 1965 which established the 4 year price support and acreage reduction programs for wheat, feed grains, cotton, and rice. First he voted to kill the bill --- then he voted for passage --- the quick switch which puts a Congressman on both sides of an issue. But farmers know where his heart is, and I know where his heart is: at the Republican country clubs in fancy neighborhoods. "
