Property taxes are at an all time high. State aids are inadequate. The only hope for better education and to prevent a sharp rise in property taxes is to be found in increasing Federal financial aid to our school system.

How does my opponent, therefore, justify his vote against Federal aid to education? How does he justify his vote to support the Presidential veto of aid to education of January, 1970 -- a veto that cost the schools of

Duluth alone \$300,000. Federal aid is drawn from the total tax base of the nation, the corporation, and personal income tax.

The Federal programs of the 1960's have brought to Northeastern Minnesota over 60 milion dollars in Federal funds stretching all across the range from Grand Rapids to Duluth to Babbitt. There is the new industrial sewage treatment plant in Grand Rapids, the Hibbing Industrial Park with three new industries all assisted with EDA funds. There is the new Hibbing Sewage Treatment Plant made possible by funds from EDA, HUD and water pollution control

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program. In Chisholm there is urban renewal and the new water works -- the first project under the program of accelerated public works and then there is the largest EDA project in America -- the water line from Lake Superior to Cloquet making possible private industries of over 450 milion dollars -- Northwest Paper Company with over 400 jobs .

In October of 1969 while Congressman Baltnik

was seeking to increase water pollution control funds from 600 million dollars to one billion dollars three Minnesota Congressmen who had within their power to make this possible on a teller vote, voted "no", thereby reducing the funds and denying Minnesota communities the resources for sewage treatment facilities.

It is a delight, as always, to be back in Northeastern Minnesota. This area is so beautiful --- it gives meaning to what we call "the quality But there is a shadow on the face of Northeastern Minnesota shadow, I believe, that is cast in part due to the traditional Republican lack of vision, the conservative, do-pothing approach to government that is held by my opponent. Some of the problems here are the problems that face Americans all over the country. \*\*\* Unemployment is climbing here, as elsewhere. (Duluth Avionics closed recently; more than 600 men lost their jobs as that company phased out.) There are a million and a half people out of work today in America who were on the job when the Republicans took over. In Minnesota the number of people out of work has doubled. Overtime pay has dwindled. Paychecks are shrinking. Part-time work is hard to find for young people who want to stay in school. The cost of living is courting. (According to federal statistics, the Twin Cities had the highest rate of inflationary increase of any city in America. The families of this area, the housewives of Northeastern Minnesota, don't need a government/economist to tell them about the cost of living. I've talked with many of you ladies | Weasedn touthere in Duluth and across the Range as you struggle each week to stretch that family food dollar.

The problems of Northeastern Minnesota are more than just the straight economic ones that afflict the rest of America. There is a vicious circle at work here. Taxes are at an all-time hing; new businesses are not attracted here; people leave both the rural areas and the urban areas --- and those that stay are taxed even higher to provide desperately needed services. The struggle here is to maintain the quality of life, to provide people with the decencies of life without making taxes so high as to be unbearable.

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Now, the solutions to the specific problems of Northeastern Minnesota are not easy, nor will they be accomplished with less than full support from local, state and federal governments.

Yet, when federal aid to education was presented as one way of helping local citizens meet their school bills, my opponent voted NO. If his vote, which represented the most obstructionist view in the Congress, if his vote had decided the issue, your schools would today be in serious trouble. Your University, your technical schools, your junior colleges - all of them would be in even greater difficulty because of lack of necessary funds. The answer to our school financing is more federal aid, not less, more federal funds, not vetoes. The answer is money coming back to Minnesota from the federal treasury in Washington.

Northeastern Minnesota, like the rest of America, wants and needs better hospital and medical services. There's a shortage of doctors in this area, and there's a shortage of adequate hospital facilities. My opponent supported a Presidential veto of a bill that would have provided more aid for Minnesota hospitals, and make here provided for more doctors for Hinnesota communities, that veto cost Minnesota hundreds of thousands of coffees. I think Minnesota needs a new medical school at buluth. It is jeopardized by this kind of short-sighted obstructionist opposition in the field of health. Do you know that Everett Dirksen, Mr. Relublican, voted for Medicare — but not my opponent.

What area of the country needs development more that Northeast Minnesota? What area needs new industries and here easy to compate its difficulties of a case industry economy more than forthcoast Minnesota? Yet, when the Model Cities Act of 1966 was voted on— to help Dulnth—— that firry radical Everett Dirksen voted yes, and my opponent voted NO. When the Area Redevelopment Bill was voted on—— this is the legislation that ultimately helped build the Duluth Arena
