

REPORT ON HUMPHREY AT VOLUNTEERS OF AMERICA

JOHN SCOTT: Former Vice President Hubert Humphrey is in New York tonight addressing the 75th Anniversary Dinner of the Volunteers of America. The Minnesota Senator talked with newsmen before the dinner, and WOR's Lester Smith asked him if he agrees with the Nixon administration's assessment of success in the South Vietnamese invasion of Laos.

HUBERT HUMPHREY: I think it's really too early. I think the administration is prone to see the rosy side of the picture. This is not unusual. I was in an administration that did the same thing. And if I can say, I may be a little scarred and a little bruised from it, I used to hear the same reports -- that if we just put a few more troops in -- if we'd just go up to Pla Cou, if we'd just bomb Hanoi, if we'd just come closer to Hai Phon(?), if we'd just do this and do that, if we'd just put more force, more bombs, more bombers, Mr. President, I can assure you the word would come this war will be shortened.

Now, I don't want to get into an argument about credibility. I believe the men that said this really believed it. The fact is it didn't shorten the war, and I think there's only one way to shorten the war, and that's to make up your mind that you'll fulfill any obligation you ever had and proceed to let the government of South Vietnam defend itself with American help, yes. Not troops. Maybe we'll have to give them economic assistance. I think that we've been there so long that the destruction is so great that it will require some assistance. But troops must be - must come out. We must get on with the business here at home. RADIO TV REPORTS, INC.

HUMPHREY SPEAKS AT VOLUNTEERS OF AMERICA

GEORGE REDDING: Senator Hubert Humphrey had some advice for Governor Rockefeller tonight. Humphrey a past and possibly present hopeful for the Presidency spoke to newsmen prior to addressing the Volunteers of America banquet here in Manhattan. WCBS Newsman Bill Fayen reports.

BILL FAYEN: Senator Humphrey told those gathered for the banquet that the greatest need in America is for the establishment of firm partnership of public and private resources in meeting the critical social welfare needs of our people. At a news conference prior to the banquet, the former Vice President and Presidential contender stressed his belief that the federal government should eventually take over all welfare responsibilities, but emphasized such a move should be phased and would take time.

Then his reaction to Governor Rockefeller's announcement that he might again seek the Presidency, if President Nixon chooses not to run in 1972.

HUBERT HUMPHREY: I say that Governor Rockefeller is a friend of mine and I think well of him, and he always makes good interesting news and interesting copy, but as a good friend, and I am his friend, I think this, that he ought to keep in mind that '72 is a bad year for Republicans. It'd be much more -- I think much more to the advantage of any of my good Republican friends to kind of wait it out. Because in '72, unless things change drastically, there's going to be a Democrat in the White House.

FAYEN: Senator Hubert Humphrey. He would not speculate as to who that Democrat might be, but when asked whether it might be a John Lindsay, who turned his back on the Republican Party, Humphrey replied, "I doubt it."

REDDING: That was Newsman Bill Fayen. Incidentally, Senator Humphrey refused to predict the winner in the Mohammed Ali-Joe Frazier fight tonight, but said, "Ali is as quick as a cat." The former Vice President said, "I greatly admire Ali," but he added, "Joe Frazier is my friend, and I usually stand with my friends." REPORT ON HUMPHREY"S SPEECH

LOU ADLER: Senator Hubert Humphrey was in New York City last night to address a meeting of the Volunteers of America at the Waldorf Astoria. The former Vice President told his audience that the greatest need in America is for a merger of public and private resources to meet social welfare needs.

At a news conference, Humphrey made it clear that he favored the government takeover of all welfare responsibilities, but at the same time, he emphasized such a move should be gradual. Humphrey was also asked about Governor Rockefeller's announcement that he might again try for the Presidency, if President Nixon does not seek re-election next year.
