REMARKS BY SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

DINNER HONORING JOSEPH DANZANSKY

Rockville, Maryland

October 5, 1971

It is a dintinct pleasure, as well as an honor, for me to pay tribute to Joseph Danzansky for his outstanding work in behalf of the metropolitan Washington community.

Were we only to give recognition to Joe's vital business leadership, however, this would still be time well spent. What a remarkable gentleman this is, a 24-karat example of a hometown boy who has made good on his own turf, and against stiff competition in the food and general merchandise marketing industry.

Being only "Number Two", he has indeed had to "try harder."
But while others may have taken the "safe way," Joe has repeatedly moved out in new directions to provide more and better services to the consumer public. He has listened carefully to the strong advocacy across the country today of the rights and concerns of the American consumer, and he has acted.

Two years ago, Joe stated his philosophy to security analysts. "It is really imperative," he said, "that we offer the customer more for his food dollar -- more quality, more value, more service, more convenience, more variety, more beautiful stores, more involvement in our community."

There you have it -- a fundamental conviction that is brief and to the point and that has a two-fold emphasis. First, respect the intelligence and the financial concerns of the people who buy your products. And second, be involved in working to build a better community where you are. I an certain that it was because of this basic creed that Joe was able to obtain the services of Esther Peterson, that wonderful "first lady" of the American consumer, both in point of time and in point of fact. The result has been expanded services that include unit pricing and shelf pull dates -- two vital indicators that are being rightly demanded

by the food purchasing public today.

Now, I am advised that while Joe's recent efforts to expand services to the consumer public for sports may have fallen slightly "short" of the mark, he has succeeded in other areas. Despite the considerable difficulty encountered by food chains in expanding into the drug store field, for example, Joe has managed to establish a foothold. And I just want you to know, Joe, that any time you want some free advice on the pharmacy business, you're welcome

to stop by my office.

But what can we possibly add here tonight to the high honors that have been bestowed upon Joe Danzansky for his profound commitment to meeting critical human needs and to making the Washington community a better place to live for all its people? Truly, this is a "son of the covenant", dedicated to living out the commandment that "thou shald love thy neighbor as thyself." The B'nai B'rith Humanitarianism Award presented to Joe in 1969 was a richly deserved honor, for he has devoted his life to the creed that all men are brothers, and he has not hesitated to serve where he is needed.

One quality that helps explain the outstanding record of Mayor Walter Washington is that he can spot a good man and make the most effective use of his abilities. In 1968, he called upon Joe to supervise the distribution of food relief to civil disturbance victims, and he asked Joe to perform a similar assignment during the subsequent Poor People's campaign. Believing that more work is always good for the soul, the Mayor again knocked on Joe's door to ask him to accept the difficult assignment as Chairman of the Economic Development Committee.

Difficult, yes. Impossible? Not to Joe Danzansky, a firmly grounded optimist in a better future for all the people of Washington, and a committed businessman who, rather than joining the flight from the inner city, has improved store facilities there and hired blacks at all position levels. So much of this man is revealed in his remarks on accepting the chairmanship of the Economic Development Committee, that I want you to listen to these quotations:

"There are pressing problems which have been a century in the making, and it would be presumptuous of me to suggest that we are going to come up with a solution overnight. We welcome the suggestions of all men of good will. Our only test of an idea will be, 'Can it work?'"

"... I sense the unmistakable feeling of moving forward. A momentum has been created which is now irreversible, and the result is going to be a better tomorrow for all of us."

I suggest that the momentum has been triggered in large part by Joe Danzansky, working quietly and diligently as a catalyst in organizing solid programs of self-help.

And I suggest to you that Joe has set the mark for all of us to achieve. There is only one way to truly honor Joe tonight, and that is by each one of us making a firm commitment to help meet the critical needs of our people for effective health care and adequate nutrition, for decent housing, for good schools for their children, and for new job opportunities to earn a good income.

Our fundamental respect for human dignity demands that we do this. The wheel of poverty grinds slowly but surely toward the destruction of the human soul and will. Why must we allow countless families to remain strapped to this wheel?

And why should not the nation's capitol become the finest example of a beautiful city offering a better life for all its people? What a dramatic celebration of America's bicentennial could be achieved by presenting to the world a city of hope and promise -- a city of solid and sustained economic growth, of full employment, of top-quality public services; a city with a full complement of direct-assistance social services to help people help themselves; and a city whose growth is carefully planned to assure pleasant surroundings and extensive opportunities for recreation and cultural enrichment.

With the cities across America facing a fiscal crisis in struggling to even maintain present public services, and with welfare costs climbing, and with the number of poor people increasing for the first time in a decade after a steady decline, this is no time to sit back and say, "Let the government take care of it." There is a major task before us to make America again a land of hope and promise, and we must set ourselves to that task now. And that means every one of you here tonight. Certainly, you who occupy positions of responsibility, of leadership, and

of influence are most able to help.

What finer tribute could we pay to Joe Danzansky than to make this pledge tonight: That there can and will be a better future for all the people of Washington. Joe is already heavily involved in this work, having chaired the United Givers Fund for two years, and now committing himself quietly but diligently to service the people through such organizations as the Urban Coalition, the Urban League, and the Center for Metropolitan Studies. He could be satisfied with awards from the YMCA, the Alexandria Boys' Club, and the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, but he is not satisfied when there is so much more that can and must be done.

For we are talking about the needs of people. Too often in government we focus on programs and projects, on finances and funding, on the structure and institutions of government,

when we should be looking at people.

We must again care. We must care about the teenager out of school and out of work, about the mother who cannot afford even a day's supply of fresh milk for her children, about the man who has lost his self-respect because he lacks the skills to get a decent job, and about the elderly widow forgotten and neglected.

But these are human beings, with needs, with concerns, with hopes and dreams. And we give the lie to our fine beliefs about brotherhood, if we do not care about the man, the woman, and the child who stands before us tonight and asks for our

help.

Joe, it is the greatness of men that produces a nation of greatness. Thank you for setting the example. Ladies and gentlemen, there is work to be done.
