\* 40.4 REMARKS BY SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY AFL-CIO CONVENTION Albuquerque, New Mexico October 15, 1971 I come to you today with a simple question, a simple answer, and a simple but important message. The question is this: What does the Nixon economic plan do for the more than 5 million Americans out of work? The answer is -- they ignore them. The message is this: What the Nixon Administration does not understand is that the number one domestic priority is Jobs-Jobs-Jobs. When the unemployment rate in the construction industry is over 10 percent, I say we need jobs. When the teenage unemployment rate is over 17 percent, I say we need jobs. When minority unemployment is over 35 percent, I say we need jobs. When unemployed workers lose their compensation benefits at the rate of over 45,000 a week, I say we need jobs. But what is the response of the Nixon Administration? They say that first we must stop inflation, then we will think about getting everybody employed. I am for stopping inflation. I am for stopping inflation that has increased over 14 percent since the Nixon Administration took office. But, I have discovered the secret administration plan for controlling inflation: You put everybody out of work, then there is no income, no money, no spending, hence, no inflation.
I say to you that when the President of the United States can ignore the plight of the poor, when he can postpone welfare reform, when he can ignore the crisis in health care, the crisis of the cities, when he can ignore hungry children, and pay lip service to the American Indians, then I say to you that it is time to blow the whistle. What does the tax package do for the ordinary citizen?
-- business gets a tax relief of nearly \$9 billion
dollars. The individual is limited to a one-time only benefit
of less than 1/3 that given corporate business. And, only last week, the Secretary of the Treasury comes to Congress and says that business needs another \$800 billion in tax relief.

I ask you: where is the concern for the working man, where is the concern for the poor, where is the concern for the small businessman? What we need for this economy is concern for the people. And, the labor movement has it. You have been in the forefront of the fight for human rights. It was with your help that the battle for equal and quality education was begun. It was with your help that we were able to outlaw discrimination by the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

It was with your help that we passed the Voting Rights Act in 1965. But, we cannot rest on the past. I call upon the Labor Movement now to break down the barriers to full economic partnership among all our people.

I have said in many speeches that the 1970's should
be a decade of Domestic Development. -1-

I say now that this development will not be complete unless the Chicanos, the Latins, and the Indians have economic

purchasing power.

Economic development is the key -- to go into the market place, to be an economic force to be recondited with -- this will add immeasurably to the self-respect and identity of minorities.

The right to a share in America is basic for all our people.

Here is what we must do:

First, we can extend the coverage of unemployment compensation for farm laborers. And, we need to add another 26 weeks for all workers to the regular unemployment compensation programs. Back in July, I proposed a bill that would extend the duration of coverage. I took it to the Senate floor. It lost then, but I am going to bring it up again, and again, and again.

Second, we can bring farm workers under the minimum wage laws. And, we can pass a \$2.25 minimum wage immediately.

Third, we can intensify educational and economic programs so that schools are relevant to the needs of the community, and an economic base for minority entrepreneurs is guaranteed. Fourth, Chicanos should run for convention delegates, run

for office, get involved in politics -- because economic power and political power go hand in hand.

I believe that the labor movement offers a great opportunity of bringing full economic participation to our citizens.

I want to work with you in that effort.

Finally, I want to make a few comments about Phase II of the Nixon program.

You know, this administration is great for redefining things. They redefined poverty or at least they have attempted to.

They call a business tax credit a job development credit. They are attempting to reorganize and redefine the function of the nonpartisan unemployment statistics bureau in Washington to report rosier findings.

Well, they have redefined Phase II -- now it is titled the Post-Freeze Economic Stabilization Program -- the PFESP -- I call it the Permanently Frozen Employment Selection-out Program.

I want to know a few things about this program. I think you will be interested in the answers also.

-- What happens to all the wage benefits lost during the freeze? Who gets them? Not the workers. But, business certainly did not lose any profits during the freeze.

-- I want to know what is going to happen to all the wage increases pending for the next six months. What is going to happen to those contracts?

-- I want to know how this administration is going to control windfall profits.

-- I want to know how this Administration is going to bring down the interest rates.

-- I want to know how this Administration can claim fairness when it is much easier to control wages than prices.

-- Finally, I suggest that this Administration is asking Congress to play a back-seat role.

I oppose this. Congress should be the co-equal partner. And, with the President's proposals -- without the advice or consent of the Senate or any board member, with any effective Congressional means of keeping a watch on the Cost of Living Council or the Price Commission, Congress is like a sleeping giant -- unable to effectively exercise its constitutional responsibilities.

In short, the elected representatives of the people will have little to say over the details of the people's economic livelihood.

Labor and the Democratic party have marched together before.

And, we shall march together again -- to bring this country back to full employment, to cool inflation, and to give those who have less a stake in the economic wealth of this nation.



WANT TO KNOW HOW THIS ADMINISTRATION CAN CLAIM FAIRNESS WHEN IT IS MUCH EASIER TO CONTROL WAGES THAN PRICES. -- FINALLY, I SUGGEST THAT THE ADMINISTRATION IS ASKING CONGRESS TO PLAY A BACK-SEAT ROLE. OPPOSE THIS. CONGRESS SHOULD BE THE CO-EQUAL PARTNER.
