

REMARKS BY SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

COPE BANQUET

San Mateo, California

November 5, 1971

I want to talk to you tonight about the Presidency.

And, I want to announce to you here in San Mateo that I am completely convinced that presidents cannot hide behind the shield of staff assistants -- away from the people, away from comment, away from the reality of the outside world.

Presidents cannot exist in splendid isolation.

And, when they do, all American citizens are the losers.

I ask you tonight -- where does the President travel?

Where does he go? How isolated is he? Where has he been? Where does he intend to go? And are these plans right for the nation?

Now, I commend the President's diplomatic initiatives in announcing plans to visit Peking and Moscow.

But I'd like to see him visit Watts or Hunters Point. I'd like to see him look at the unemployment lines in this nation.

I'd like to see him come to San Mateo -- to a labor meeting to talk about the wage-price freeze and the despair that countless workers feel because they may be the next to lose their jobs in this confused and floundering economy.

Where does the President go when he leaves the White House?

He travels almost 1,000 miles to the Detroit Economic Club to answer questions from big business.

But, he will not go to an AFL-CIO meeting one block from the White House to consult with labor leaders on his economic game plan.

He spends his week-ends in seclusion in Key Biscayne or San Clemente or Camp David. But when is the last time he went into the inner city? When did he last see a welfare recipient or an elderly person trying to survive inflation on a fixed income?

Yes, and when did he last visit a college campus?

Does he really know the American people? Is he really in tune with their problems, their hopes, their dreams, their aspirations?

He met with his economic advisers at Camp David -- completely surrounded, completely protected. And, they came up with an economic plan of sorts.

It might have been a more equitable plan if they had met in a labor hall and with labor leaders.

The President salutes American agriculture. But where does he do it? At a California rice farm? At a Midwest wheat farm? No, he does it on the front lawn of the White House in Washington.

Maybe that's why he has no agricultural policy. Maybe that's why farm income is lower than it has been since the depths of the Great Depression.

In short, the President avoids going where he will hear the voice of the people. The result is hardly surprising:

I ask you tonight: Who has a voice at the White House?

Who speaks for the farmers? I'll tell you. No one.

Who speaks for the consumers? I'll tell you -- No one.

Who speaks for labor? I'll tell you -- No one.

Who speaks for students? I'll tell you -- No one.

Who speaks for children -- yours and mine? I'll tell you -- No one.

Who speaks for the working men and women? I'll tell you -- No one.

But we know who speaks for big business, the merchants, the big corporations, the bank presidents, the financial houses, the large corporate farms.

The blunt fact is that the President has lost touch with the American people.

If we were in touch, he could not have waited 2 1/2 years before he acted against devastating inflation.

He could not have allowed unemployment to climb to over 5.5 million persons.

He could not have allowed teenage unemployment to rise to over 17 percent.

He could not have allowed interest rates to go sky high.

He could not have allowed the productive machinery of private enterprise to dwindle to 75 percent of capacity.

When it came to power, the Administration said it would be an open administration.

But, the door has been slammed.

When he does speak to the people, the President invariably filters his words through the electronic maze of television.

The President has held only 20 press conferences in two years and eleven months.

But he has been on television over 46 times -- that is 20 times more than President Johnson during his five years in office, and three times more than in the two years and ten months of President Kennedy.

Thus, the Nixon Presidency has become a shielded Presidency, a restricted presidency, an isolated presidency.

And, as a result, this Administration lacks the programs equal to the demands of the times.

It has no program for jobs. It has no program for economic conversion for defense industries and no system for compensating workers who are thrown out of jobs by closing defense plants.

It has no program for building the countless public projects our cities and rural communities need so badly.

It has no program for providing mass transit.

It has no program for revitalizing rural America.

But, it does have a program for freezing wages.

It does have a program for sidestepping the critical questions of high corporate profits, high unemployment, of high interest rates, and ever-increasing prices.

Its program is simple: It substitutes the illusion of progress for real action, real plans, real results.

Small wonder there is a crisis of confidence in the nation today. The stock market tumbles. Consumers are reluctant to spend.

Plants remain under-utilized. Complaints from the working man that prices are increasing even though there is a freeze are dismissed by the Administration.

What it amounts to is this: Dismal failure.

Yet, the Administration keeps telling us, "We are succeeding." "Our policies are sound."

And, they are right. Their policies are soundly producing both inflation and unemployment.

They have succeeded in putting more people on the unemployment compensation rolls than had been there in a decade.

They have succeeded in reversing a ten-year decline in the number of Americans living in poverty.

They have succeeded in making 65 American cities -- the highest number in a decade -- centers of persistent and substantial unemployment.

What this Administration just does not understand is that the number one domestic priority of this nation must be jobs, jobs, jobs.

The Administration has but one plan for dealing with the unemployment problem -- ignore it.

Americans expect more from their President.

They have a right to expect our national government to solve the problems of the economy with farmers for all Americans.

They should be able to trust and have confidence in their government.

They have a right to expect job opportunities -- because jobs mean that families stay together and live and grow together.

There are urgent things to be done. And, with your help we can do them.

We can have meaningful tax reform to give the working man a break and stimulate purchasing power.

We can increase farm income, and stimulate the housing market.

We can insist on reduced interest rates.

We can accelerate and expand public works projects.

We can pass welfare reform and give direct financial aid to our hard-pressed cities.

We can begin investing our resources in people.

And we can begin in November, 1972, with your help to have a Decade of Dynamic Domestic Development.

We can reverse the tide that has made this nation privately wealthy but publicly poor.

Above all, we can restore the trust, the faith, and the confidence of people in their government and in their President.
