HUMPHREY PROROSES FIVE-POINT LAW ENFORCEMENT

AND EMERGE REHABILITATION PROGRAM TO COMBAT DRUG PROBLEM

a major, five-pronged offensive against drug addiction and drug abuse the that proposed considerably beyond Admisnistration proposals.

Speaking here at Concept House, a drug treatment center, Senator Humphrey called for a double-edged approach \$to the problem consisting of "strong and aggressive law enforcement coupled with broader and better rehabilitation and education programs."

Humphrey proposed:

Agency with authority in both law enforcement and in drug treatent and education." He saip such an agency was needed to end the Federal government's present fragmented approach which spreads responsibility and authority across a multiplicity of Federal Agencies.

-- "A massive increase in Federal appropriations for drug treatment and rehabilitaion."

He called the newly submitted [budget allocation of \$230 million "totally inadequate" for this purpose, "particularly when you consider that hard-core addicts steal momentum more than \$1 billion in property each year to maintain their habits."

-- "All-out efforts to reach finternational agreements that would cut off the flow of heroin into the United States

from abroad."

-- "Stepped-up sales Federal efforts to bring about more effective self-policing of promiscuous dispensing and prescribing of dangerous drugs, such as amphetamines, within the medical and pair pharmaceutical professions."

-- "The immediate convening by the President of a White House Conference and a series of regional conferences on drug abuse and law enforcement."

Senator Humphrey said the conferences would map and coordinated Federal, state, county and city strategies for law enforcement and drug rehabilitation of states and catalog local and regional needs so that realistic budgets at all levels of government could be drawn up.

The Senator & said the Administration has failed to move forcefully enough to end the smaggaring smuggling of heroin into the United States and to negotiate the testal eradication of opium cultivation in all nations.

"It is time we made known to our friends around the world that we will not permit the cultivation and export of a poison that destroys the lives of hundreds of thousands of Americans and which is responsible for a substantial portion of American crime," he Sail

"And we shawkhim should enlist the efforts of the CIA in this battle. If the CIA can ferret out subversives, it can find the dope sm smuggler and put him out of business.

But even if the enforcement battle is won, he said, "nearly 200,000 hard-core addicts in this country need help and are left out of the Administration's new drug abuse program.

"And what about the millions of young Amerticans who are using and abusing drugs drugs photoscopic photoscopic drugs?"

"For these we need expanded education and rehabilitation by JALAQ programs, Instead of the resent rehabilitation crisis we because of inadequate numbers of rehabilitation centers in communities.

- -- Young people under 21 are arrested at the rate of one every 5 minutes in connection with the use, possession, or transaction in drugs.

 NARCOTIC ARRESTS HAVE INCREASED 322 PERCENT SINCE THE BEGINNING

 OF THIS DECADE.
- -- DRUG ABUSE IS A SUBURBAN AS WELL AS AN URBAN PROBLEM. \
 AND IT IS ALSO FOUND WITH INCREASING FREQUENCY IN RURAL COMMUNITIES.
- -- THE ANNUAL COST OF NARCOTIC ADDICTION IN TERMS OF STOLEN
 PROPERTY ALONE MAY WELL BE OVER A BILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

-- Police estimate that a hard-core addict may steal \$400 to \$500 worth of Goods to support a \$75 a day habit.

Assuming that half of America's addicts steal to support their habits, the total value of Goods stolen every day by hard core addicts is approximately \$25 million.

What are the people of Cleveland going to do about the drug problem, the hunger problem, the education problem and many other problems which affect millions of Americans.

Government alone can't do the job.

People such as yourselves--community leaders--must lead the way in making government more responsive to people's needs.

In the drug area you must urge that rehabilitation clinics be established, drug education courses started for junior high students and a renewed effort against drug pushers be led by local police.

We must all begin to think how we can fill the gap between 210 million

Americans and representative government staffed by a bureaucracy of millions.

I want to see government make its primary concern service and help for people.

It can and it must.

But a government that meets people's needs, that alleviates poverty, that builds homes, that educates children, that provides jobs must do these things with people--in a partnership of common purpose.

This is what I want to see happen in America.
