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HUMPHREY URGES PRESS CREDENTIALS FOR COLLEGE EDITORS AT DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Feb. 11--Senator Hubert H. Humphrey proposed today that the Nation's college and university newspaper editors be accredited to cover the proceedings of the Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach in July.

"We have opened the Democratic Party to those who had been underrepresented in the past," Humphrey told an audience of College Young Democrats here.

"While only four per cent of the delegates to the 1968 convention were under 30, this group will have 15 to 20 per cent representation at this year's convention.

"I believe we should also open our proceedings to representatives of the college news media, and I have set forth this proposal in a letter to National Chairman Larry O'Brien, urging him to provide these representatives with full and complete press credentials.

"American youth is rightly demanding full participation in the politica process. Young Americans should have both the right and the obligation to share in the decisions that will affect their lives.

"And they can only do so when they are well informed--not just by the television networks and what they sometimes call the 'establishment press,' but by their peers, by those who share their concerns about the American future.

"I believe the Democratic Party should now go this additional step,

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building on the outstanding work of the Fraser Commission and the Democratic National Committee in opening the party to full and active participation by all of its elements--youth, women, blacks and other minorities.

"This is an essential part of the Democratic reform movement. It will say emphatically to young Americans that our party is open, that the day of the political machine, of the backroom kingmaker, of the patronage payoffs is over."

Senator Humphrey coupled his proposal with criticism of the Nixon Administration "for its failure to listen to youth and bring them into the councils of government," and with a series of concrete steps to bring youth into real participation in government decision making.

"The youth of our Nation wants more than a pre-dawn visit to the Lincoln Memorial in Washington for a brief rap session with a President who refuses to listen to them during his working hours," Humphrey said.

As President, I would create an Office of Youth Affairs in the Executive office of the President and give the young chairman of that office cabinet-level rank.

"The office would have the primary responsibility of bringing young people into all government agencies, in meaningful, decision and policy level rolls.

"I have visited more than 150 college campuses in the last several years. Since I returned to the Senate I have met with groups of young people at least twice a week. They are concerned about Vietnam, yes. But they are also concerned about the things that trouble other Americans—high unemployment, inadequate health care for large numbers of our people, ill—housing, urban decay, rural blight and the whole litany of festering problems the Nixon Administration has failed to face.

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"I say young Americans have a crucial stake in our efforts to solve these problems. And they must be brought into the decision-making process of our society."

Senator Humphrey also said that as President he would immediately convene a White House Conference on People's Participation in Government and expand programs such as his Senate-passed Interns for Political Leadership Act.

The White House Conference would be held in regions throughout the Nation, he said, "bringing youth, the elderly, businessmen, workers, and other groups into face to face meetings with officials from all levels of government--federal, state and local.

"This can lay the foundation for a new partnership between people and government, a partnership formed not in Washington, but where the people live and work."

Humphrey said his Interns for Political Leadership Act will provide for at least 1,000 internships each year so that students can work directly with government officials as part of their academic training, gaining on-the job experience, and participating in decision-making.

"This should be only the start," Humphrey said. "We need to greatly expand such programs. By so doing we can bring the fresh air of new ideas from young people into sluggish government bureaucracies.

"We can begin to give American youth much more than the vote. We can give them access to the power levers of our society. We can enlist their voice and their help in moving ahead on our urgent domestic agenda."

I HAVE WRITTEN TO DNC CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE O'BRIEN RECOMMENDING
