The other day I saw a bumper sticker which said: "Come see Florida while it's still here."

Well, my friends, the Florida which we all know and love so well is threatened.

Millions of Americans have come to Florida in search of a healthy climate, clean air and water, beautiful beaches and bays, great recreational opportunities and some of the best seafood in the nation.

Florida has meant for young and old a place to find shelter from the cold North -- a place to start a new life.

But like the rest of the nation, Florida's rapid growth in some areas is endangering nature's wonders which have made the state so great.

We need balanced growth and development in this nation and in this state.

Right now, we don't have it. Nationally, we have crowded 70 percent of our people on only 2 percent of the land. Congestion, smog, traffic jams, miles of concrete ribbons have become a way of life for too many Americans.

Here in Florida, we're somewhat better off. The population increased 37 percent in the last decade -- and there have been nearly one and a half million newcomers. But 70 percent of Florida's population lives on 20 percent of the land -- not two percent.

Florida is growing. But I wonder if anybody is asking the tough questions:

-- Where are you going to put the millions who want to come here to live?

-- Will there be enough jobs? Enough good homes? Enough doctors? Enough clean water to drink? Enough parks for recreation?

Growth in America today is helter-skelter, unplanned and unmanageable.

-- And wat are the consequences? We can see examples right here in Florida:

-- We see Escambia and Pensacola Bays suffering from industrial and municipal pollution.

-- We see Tampa Bay threatened by oil spills and slicks.

-- We see a once beautiful St. Johns River heavily polluted from oil, chemical and industrial wastes.

-- We see dredging and filling threatening such preserves as the Big Cyprus Swamp.

-- We see South Florida facing shortages from water quality and water resources.

I do not believe that this is the kind of record Floridians want.

What are the answers?

Zero growth or no growth is not an answer.

The answer is planned growth, people-oriented growth, reasoned growth and growth which protects the environment -- not destroys it.

How are we going to get it?

First, we need to begin to plan our growth. We must consider th environmental impact of government programs and of private development.

We cannot continue to allow developers and real estate speculators to destroy the delicately balanced wetlands and marshes. It's time to stop the fast buck developers and quick profit seekers from overriding the public interest.

Second, we must recognize that improving our environment through planning our growth will not be cheap. Are we willing to pay the bill? We must.

Third, we have to be resolute. Doing something about pollution, planning our growth, is not a one night stand. It takes sustained effort. It takes a sustained effort to see that laws are enforced.

It takes commitment -- not just from the leaders. But, more importantly, from the people.

I believe we can do it. I believe we can protect our oceans from dumping.

I believe we can understand growth, development and nature. And I believe if nature wins, man wins.

Finally, we need solid programs.


