REMARKS BY SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY Before the NATIONAL EXPLORER PRESIDENTS! CONGRESS Sheraton Park Hotel Washington, D.C. April 4, 1974 Whenever the word "explorer" is mentioned to some people, it brings to their minds a bronzed, athletic sort of man or woman -- perhaps one who has climbed several mountains of taken a trip up the Amazon. But as a former Scoutmaster, and one who has been familiar with the programs of the Explorers for years, that word means far more to me. It means that there is an organization of young people with active, inquiring minds who have launched into the exploration of the many complex and diverse facets of this modern world.

It is not only the physical features of this world that need exploration, it is every discipline of the mind, every method of government and perhaps some things that are too new to have been regarded seriously yet.

I consider "exploration" in the broad sense of the word as one of the most important activities of the human race. For without exploration there would be no discovery, no progress, and worse yet, little spirit of creativity. Without these, the hope of the world for better days would be without substance.

I would like to consider myself an explorer, even though I have not had the opportunity to become an Explorer with a capital "E." But I was a Scout in Reverend Hartt's Troop 24 back in the little town of Doland, South Dakota. Later, I was a Scoutmaster of Troop 6 in Huron, South Dakota.

Back in those days our people were pretty down on their luck. Dust storms and a Depression had left them with few of the items that we sometimes regard as necessities today. We had a rule that no one could have a new uniform, because we didn't want any boy to feel inadequate or inferior. So we passed around second-hand uniforms and tried to outfit each boy from the handme-downs of older brothers. We made some of our camping equipment.

Old Troop 6 was versatile when it came to meetings. We didn't even start out as a church basement operation because the church budget, like everything else, was the victim of the Depression and didn't stretch far enough to pay for heating the basement.

We were sponsored by the Good Fellowship Class of the Methodist Church, and my first meeting was held in the church's vestibule during a dust storm. Later on, we met outside the church, in the basement of Humphrey's Drug Store and in my living room.

But we got the church basement heated, even though we had to explore a rather unorthodox financing method. I think this little incident might better define what I meant by the broad use of the word "explore." We truly had to explore our ingenuity to come up with this one.

We announced a big troop bean feed and promoted it all over town. A big crowd turned out and shivered through the meal. We had conveniently forgotten to tell the folks that the basement wasn't heated. But after the bean feed, enough money came from somewhere to have it heated for us from then on.

I did my Scouting work right with the boys, starting as a Second Class Scout. I went on to Life Scout, but unfortunately, I didn't have the opportunity to finish my work as an Eagle Scout. We had six Eagles in Troop 6, and that was good for those days.

The Explorer program adds an all-important dimension to Scouting. It provides a bridge for that crucial crossover into adulthood.

I know that government is one of the areas that Explorer units study. Naturally, I think that involvement in government is one of the most exciting activities in the world. It is also truly an area of interest that needs and deserves your most careful attention.

The current difficulties of some officials and former officials have led some to believe that young people should not get involved in government. That is a frightening thought. What if most of the bright young people of this country suddenly decided to shy away from public service? The effect would be devastating.

It has been said that people get the kind of government they deserve, and if we ever should be unfortunate enough to frighten bright young people away from the service of their institutions of government, we would deserve the poor government that would follow.

The activities of the Explorer program stimulate interest in the kind of activities that government should be involved in. As leaders in this program, I urge you to go back to your home states and encourage others to actively pursue their interests in government. By that I mean their interest in this nation's problems.

What opinions do you have on how to solve this nation's energy crunch? How do you feel about the cost of health care in this country? What is your position on campaign reform, antipollution measures, tax reform, grain sales and a whole host of other problems that face this country?

I'll tell you this. Unless you have a position on these issues, unless you take the trouble to study some of them and get other Explorers and other young and not-so-young people interested in them, you may find that your elected officials do a much poorer job of legislating to solve them. And your administrators may do a much poorer job of carrying out that legislation.

Those of us in the Congress and the people down at the White House cannot and should not be allowed to operate in a vacuum. The intelligent, considered opinions of the people of this country, and especially the leaders like yourselves, are just as necessary as those of us who hold office. Ideas, good ideas, are the grist for the mill of legislation. And I can tell you from experience that Presidents and Senators and Congressmen and Governors and Mayors have no monopoly on good ideas.

So, my young friends, continue to explore. Explore government and athletics and a hundred other areas. And if you keep it up until you're my age, you will have made this world a better place to live.

I CONSIDER "EXPLORATION" IN THE BROAD SENSE OF THE WORD AS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES OF THE HUMAN RACE, FOR WITHOUT EXPLORATION THERE WOULD BE NO DISCOVERY, NO PROGRESS, AND WORSE YET, LITTLE SPIRIT OF CREATIVITY WITHOUT THESE, THE HOPE OF THE WORLD FOR BETTER DAYS WOULD BE WITHOUT SUBSTANCE. I WOULD LIKE TO CONSIDER MYSELF AN EXPLORER, EVEN THOUGH I HAVE NOT HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME AN EXPLORER WITH A

BACK IN THOSE DAYS OUR PEOPLE WERE PRETTY DOWN ON THEIR

LUCK. DUST STORMS AND A DEPRESSION HAD LEFT THEM WITH FEW OF THE

ITEMS THAT WE SOMETIMES REGARD AS NECESSITIES TODAY WE HAD A

RULE THAT NO ONE COULD HAVE A NEW UNIFORM, BECAUSE WE DIDN'T

WANT ANY BOY TO FEEL INADEQUATE OR INFERIOR SO WE PASSED AROUND

SECOND-HAND UNIFORMS AND TRIED TO OUTFIT EACH BOY FROM THE HAND
ME-DOWNS OF OLDER BROTHERS WE MADE SOME OF OUR CAMPING EQUIPMENT.

OLD TROOP 6 WAS VERSATILE WHEN IT CAME TO MEETINGS. WE DIDN'T EVEN START OUT AS A CHURCH BASEMENT OPERATION BECAUSE THE CHURCH BUDGET, LIKE EVERYTHING ELSE, WAS THE VICTIM OF THE DEPRESSION AND DIDN'T STRETCH FAR ENOUGH TO PAY FOR HEATING THE BASEMENT.

We were sponsored by the Good Fellowship Class of the Methodist Church, and my first meeting was held in the church's vestibule during a dust storm. Later on, we met outside the church, in the basement of Humphrey's Drug Store and in my Living Room.

BUT WE GOT THE CHURCH BASEMENT HEATED, EVEN THOUGH WE HAD TO EXPLORE A RATHER UNORTHODOX FINANCING METHOD. IT THIS LITTLE INCIDENT MIGHT BETTER DEFINE WHAT I MEANT BY THE BROAD USE OF THE WORD "EXPLORE." WE TRULY HAD TO EXPLORE OUR INGENUITY TO COME UP WITH THIS ONE.

WE ANNOUNCED A BIG TROOP BEAN FEED AND PROMOTED IT ALL OVER TOWN A BIG CROWD TURNED OUT AND SHIVERED THROUGH THE MEAL. WE HAD CONVENIENTLY FORGOTTEN TO TELL THE FOLKS THAT THE BASEMENT WASN'T HEATED BUT AFTER THE BEAN FEED, ENOUGH MONEY CAME FROM SOMEWHERE TO HAVE IT HEATED FOR US FROM THEN ON. I DID MY SCOUTING WORK RIGHT WITH THE BOYS, STARTING AS A SECOND CLASS SCOUT. I WENT ON TO LIFE SCOUT, BUT UNFORTUNATELY, I DIDN'T HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO FINISH MY WORK AS AN EAGLE SCOUT. WE HAD SIX EAGLES IN TROOP 6, AND THAT WAS GOOD FOR THOSE

DAYS,

GET INVOLVED IN GOVERNMENT. THAT IS A FRIGHTENING THOUGHT. WHAT

IF MOST OF THE BRIGHT YOUNG PEOPLE OF THIS COUNTRY SUDDENLY DECIDED

TO SHY AWAY FROM PUBLIC SERVICE? THE EFFECT WOULD BE DEVASTATING.

IT HAS BEEN SAID THAT PEOPLE GET THE KIND OF GOVERNMENT THEY DESERVE, AND IF WE EVER SHOULD BE UNFORTUNATE ENOUGH TO FRIGHTEN BRIGHT YOUNG PEOPLE AWAY FROM THE SERVICE OF THEIR INSTITUTIONS OF GOVERNMENT, WE WOULD DESERVE THE POOR GOVERNMENT THAT WOULD FOLLOW. THE ACTIVITIES OF THE EXPLORER PROGRAM STIMULATE INTEREST IN THE KIND OF ACTIVITIES THAT GOVERNMENT SHOULD BE INVOLVED IN AS LEADERS IN THIS PROGRAM, I URGE YOU TO GO BACK TO YOUR HOME STATES AND ENCOURAGE OTHERS TO ACTIVELY PURSUE THEIR INTERESTS IN GOVERNMENT.
