### REMARKS OF SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

### ALFALFA CLUB ANNUAL MEETING

Washington, D.C.

December 9, 1975

Gentlemen of Alfalfa, I am honored to welcome you here to this annual meeting in these austere surroundings.

Tarzan says, "Jane, its a goddamn jungle out there."

Yes, its going to be rough next year, especially in the presidential race.

You know, they say that Americans love the underdog. And next year they'll have plenty to choose from. The voters are going to have more freedom of choice than at "Gino's."

Obviously, there are lots of underdogs to go around, and they all are going to have their troubles.

And you look at Lloyd Bentsen. He's almost unique -- the first man to run for the Presidency after only two years in the Senate... (pause)... since Richard Nixon.

And our perennial candidate, George Wallace, could be badly embarrassed if he has his supporters bused in for a demonstration.

Fred Harris has a real problem with those boots he wears. If they ever decide that they can show Ronald Reagan's old movies on television, then he could split the cowboy vote.

In fact, Reagan could sweep the nation with the slogan "Let's win this one for the Gipper" -- except that Notre Dame's football team hasn't done too well this year.

So it's going to be a scramble in the primaries. You know, there's been a lot of talk about each candidate getting a medical examination and making it public -- a sort of Marcus-Welby-type "full disclosure."

Well, I think we can do better than that, and streamline the primary contests at the same time. We'll put all the candidates on national television in a big, open alfalfa field. And we'll give them each a stick of chewing gum-to chew and tell them to start walking.

The last man left standing will be the front runner -- and a sure bet to beat Ford in the fall.
