REMARKS OF SENATOR HUBERT H. HUMPHREY

44th INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

SUPREME SONS OF NORWAY

Alexandria, Minnesota August 28, 1976

I am deeply honored to have been asked to visit with the many delegates to this 44th convention of the International Sons of Norway. My long and fruitful association with this organization is a matter of great pride. I have a feeling of kinship and brotherhood with all of you.

It's doubly good to be able to welcome you to our beautiful State of Minnesota. I know I speak for the next Vice President of the United States -- that great Norwegian Democrat Fritz Mondale -- in extending a hearty welcome!

In this Bicentennial year, Americans of every heritage celebrate the unique history which is ours as Americans. This is a very special birthday. It is the 200th anniversary of our system of government -- the greatest force for freedom in the history of civilization. It is a time for celebration, and a time for reflection -- on what we have become and what we want to be.

What we have become has been a measure of our willingness to work together -- peoples from every part of the globe, united in the spirit of freedom of mankind and the belief that free men and women can govern themselves.

Some three million Americans today look to Norway as their homeland. The mutuality of our two histories is easily recognizable in the tapestry we call the United States. Threads of varying colors and textures, each one separate, achieve a greater fullness because of the presence of the others.

No nation has added more strength to the fabric of our democratic society, none has blessed our land with more enlightenment, sense of purpose, or commitment to the ideals of a free and just nation.

Almost one year ago, on October 9, we celebrated the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the RESTAURATIONEN, bringing the first organized group of settlers to make America their new home.

With the presence of His Majesty King Olav V we commemorated the contributions made by Norwegian-Americans in every aspect of American life. And we pledged to continue the strong bond between our peoples and between our governments.

As I look to what America will become in the next 100 years, I call on you to maintain the efforts you have made to make America what it should be.

Much remains to be done.

We are the richest nation on earth, yet many of our people continue to suffer the pain of poverty and the humiliation of unemployment.

- -- We have great medical technologies -- yet millions of Americans still do not have access to decent health care at a cost they can afford.
- -- There are Americans who don't have a decent home, who suffer from emotional disease and alienation, and who labor under serious physical handicaps which prevent their full participation in American life.

Solutions to these problems will require the best that is in us.

We must look to our heritage as something not just to be pulled out and praised on anniversaries, but as a strength and spirit that can make our nation -- indeed, the international community of nations -- strong and free and happy.

Your efforts have shown us the way in so many areas of American life. I challenge you to continue this work, knowing that the choices you make can affect the course of the future for Americans of every heritage.
