We have just celebrated our bicentennial. It was a momentous event for us, but that is history. It is the past. You are the future.

Victor Hugo aptly said:

"The future has several names. For the weak, it is impossible. For the fainthearted, it is unknown. For the thoughtful and valiant, it is ideal. The challenge is urgent. The task is large. The time is now."

I've learned to start each day as if it were the first of a new and exciting experience. Every day is a new beginning.

The only limit you have to your realization of tomorrow will be your doubts of today. I want you to move forward into tomorrow with strong and active faith in yourselves. I do not believe that the era of the pioneer is at an end, I only believe that the area for pioneering has changed.

You must make yourselves the pioneers of America's third century. You must learn from the past, or you will repeat the mistakes of history. But you must not be bound by the past or the present as you dare to explore new frontiers.

Today I want to tell you where we are and give you an agenda of new opportunities -- new frontiers which must be pioneered in our third century.

Our society is in the midst of a painful readjustment. We are learning that our affluence and our national resources are not limitless.

We are faced with the grim reality of hunger at home and starvation abroad. We are increasingly dependent for energy and other basic raw materials on poorer nations that are jealous of our wealth and suspicious of our motives.

We no longer have the power to solve every international crisis and enforce our will around the world by diplomacy or military might.

We are threatened within by crime and the fear that crime breeds, by the relaxation of moral and ethical standards, and by the flight from responsibility that causes people to drop out, run away from their problems, or seek refuge in drugs and alcohol.

In meeting these challenges we face as a nation; in achieving the goals we set for ourselves as a society -- our nation needs bold and persistent experimentation. We must find new methods, new means.

We must not take the slogan, "It can't be done," as an answer or an attitude. It is common sense to take a method and try it. If it fails, admit it frankly and try another. But above all, we must try something.

Now is the time when new policies for our future must be molded. I urge you to be informed about the future issues that we must address right now and to find ways to express your views and to share your concerns with other interested citizens.

Politics is the way we get things done in our system.

It is the life-blood of our representative democracy.

It is the vehicle of change, bringing forth new ideas, new concepts of government, and new leaders.

It is the means by which conflicts and competing interests of different races, religions, regions, generations and cultural life styles can be resolved peacefully.

You are our future leaders, and yes, our future politicians. You must take the vanguard in solving, through politics, the challenges we face.

But not only politics -- get involved wherever you are, wherever you can have an impact. Get involved now.

The years in which your generation will play the leading role -- the formative years of our nation's third century -- may be decisive in the future of this nation. It will be up to you to insure we survive as a strong, free nation, and as a people who believe in equal opportunity and justice for all.

We must find a way to give each and every individual a job -- meaningful employment, not just "make-work." No section of our society should be written off. We must not bow to cliches, such as "free market," and allow any individual to remain unproductive and not wanted in our society.

We must find the ways to conserve our energy and raw materials and find new sources. But at the same time, we must do everything possible to preserve our natural resources and environment.

We must revitalize the cities, make them again the cultural, economic and communication hubs of our civilization. We must make them safe, beautiful, renewed. Renewed not just by new construction, but by new faith and support -- where a genuine sense of "neighborhood" or "community" can be established.

We must clothe the needy, feed the hungry and make adequate housing, health care and educational opportunities available to all our citizens.

This is a big order, but I believe we can do all these things.

The future is now. We must start today. There must be an active commitment of every American citizen -- young and old, rich and poor, black and white, men and women.

In the last decade or so, new roles have been opening up for young people, for women, and for minorities. New ideas are shattering old myths and stereotypes that held people back or kept them down. New talents have been liberated to enrich our national life.

This great movement of change has had a profound impact on our system of politics and government.

It has brought about reform in our political parties, reforms in the Congress, and limits on the powers of the President.

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It has inspired millions of citizens to involve themselves in the great social issues of our time -- civil rights, poverty, hunger, the environment, the energy crisis.

I think most people believe in the ultimate ability of America to solve its problems and to continue to progress. They have faith in our political system. People continue to think that the government, with the right leaders, can be made to work effectively and that even the most intractable problems will yield to creative and energetic leadership.

The future is today. I want to tell you that you can start -- you must start -- today to build America in its third century.

We desperately need the compassion and idealism of youth in public life.

We need your energy and your enthusiasm.

We welcome the participation of students and other young people who seriously feel the responsibility of being citizens in a free society and want to do something about it.

Be true to yourself, listen to your conscience, and then wade in and seek a meaningful experience in practical, real politics.

We have a new Administration in Washington -- a new President and Vice President. And we have new leadership in Congress, new people who are interested in developing policies for all our citizens.

These new leaders need your help. Bring to them your fresh ideas, your social conscience, your visions for America's future.

New initiatives are being developed to solve our energy crisis, to give jobs to our unemployed, to revitalize our cities and our national economy.

Tell us what must be done and keep after us until it gets done. Get involved and help us do the job. You can make this government accountable and effective only if you, and others like you, care enough to get involved and do something about it.

I especially urge you to keep in touch with what is going on in the Congress, because that is where the issues will be defined most clearly. And the outcome will be expressed in legislation that will effect each of you directly and individually.

We cannot afford to waste any talents in our efforts to create a more just, humane and democratic society. The problems we face as a nation today will require the best efforts of all citizens, men and women, rich and poor, young and old, if we are to find solutions. I urge you to pledge yourselves personally to that cause in this year, the first in our nation's third century.

I have been in so many of these meetings, I believe that I have missed very few over the years. Only those years when I was away from Washington due to the will of the electorate. But, I've always attended and always enjoyed the experience of being with the representative of the 50 states that are here representing your states in the Senate Youth Program. What an interesting study it would be, and I hope that it will be done, to see what has happened to those kmakxhwho attended this programs over the years. A soci@logical study. It's one we should ask Georgetown or George Washington or American University, or Catholic University; one of them here in Washington just what happened in their lives. Did this youth program have an impact ? Did it inspire you? Did it encourage you? Did it give you incentive to enter public life? Or did you EXEMPETERXXXX see something that compelled you or ....into the professions of what-ever they may be or whatever your interests might be. What a joy it would be to find that out. While you're here in Washington, I know you've had all too little time to see some of the things you would have liked to have seen with more time on your hands. This city is a center, for not only politics, but it's a center for culture, it's a center for many of the great professions . Here, is a great educational center; I have mentioned some of the universities and colleges that we have. It is a city that belongs to the American people. In every building, this building, all these great government buildings are yours. | The White House is the people's house, belongs to the people, and I'm very happy to note that the man who now occupies it seems to give that picture of himself that he belongs to the people, and that the White House is an open house, and I'm so pleased that he has seen fit to recognize that his predessor, President Ford, also made this picture of the White House a reality. I'm a democrat by politics, but only of my closest friends in this city was the former President of the United States, Jerry Ford, because he was a good man. He was a man who was deeply involved with political life of our nation. and as I told him one time when Mrs. Humphrey and I were priveged to have dinner with Betty and Gerald Ford, we

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we had just an evening together, with the family for about three hours. It was right ofter the election, and I know what it means to lose a close election, I lost one like that for the Presidency, te lost one, very close, very very close, and generally people are always writing about how morose you are, and now down you are, and now bitter you are, which is really not fact. I saw this man not morose or bitter, Of course we always like to win when we're in contest. But I sat there and visited with him, and I said this to the President Ford. I said, you know history will not remember the bills that you vetoed, or the arguments that we had in Congress with you. History will not even remember the differences between our economic attitudes, or economic philosophy. What history will remember about you is that you restored decency and dignity and honor to the office of the Presidency. | I also said to him, you know Mr. President, I wanted to be in this house, that was my Life's ambition. I didn't make it, but I said that I would have given at least five years of my life to have had two days, two weeks, two months in this house. You have had two-and-a-half years. So, feel good. With that note we broke off, and went to see what was going on in the White House. I mention this to you because when you're here in Washington many times you will be told, oh there s bitter arguments going on, I mean there's this fellow, and there's that fellow, and they're fighting with each other, and the political parties are tearing at each other. / Well, good debate, good argument, dialogue, dissent, within the rules of the game, all this is part of the democratic process. But, there's very little rankor, there's no room for hatred, or bitterness. I know I don't have any, it takes too much energy, to get all wound up to hate someone. It takes too much out of you to be bitter, and it's a genuine joy to have a good argument as I have regularly over at the United States Senate. Gets your blood warm, makes your glands percolate, and you'll find out, after it's all through, that most of those who have been in that argument are personal friends. So, politics in a democracy must be an experience in human relations

it is not war, it's communication. You keep that in mind as you go away from the Nation's capitol. There are not bitter entrenced forces here, out to do each other in there are forces here that disagree on the approach to a problem, but both sides seeking an answer to the problem. Now, occasionally, you will find someone that violates that gerneral rule, that feels that it's maybe more dramatic or that you prove yourself to be tougher by being arrogant, mean, bitter. But, I'll tell you fack that it's a very small minority, and they have little or no influence. They burn themselves out, besides that, they are a bore, and there's nothing worse than politics than bordom. So, today I thought I'd just converse with you a little bit about some of the things that are happening, and maybe we can find this period time we have together to be of mutual benefit. You and I know that we just celebrated our bicentenial. I remember hearing that young people were down-playing the bicentenial. I remember all the cynics that were saying, oh well there's nobody that will be to be interested, and after all, all it will be will be a lot of 4th of July celebration. The bicentenial was one of the great healing experiences in this country. All over this land, in every little village, town, and hamlet, people did things together proved they could work together, became a part of the American scene as never before. People who had only been here a few years all at once thought that they came over on the Mayflower. As a matter of fact, we began to understand that really we are a nation of immigrants. We are a people of different backrounds. But like most anything that's beautiful, it comes from contrast. If you have only one color in a painting, it isn't very beautiful. Take a look at the walls you see here, take a look at what you have here. There's blending, and we like to preserve some identify. That bicentenial gave us that opportunity. And, we found ourselves, we found who we were, where we were, where we came from, what we are. And, now we have to find out where we're going. We need to build on the past, not to push it aside, but to build on it. Victor Hugo is one of my favorite writers, and I'd like to quote a phrase or a little

paragraph that he wrote, and it's very wonderful. You r ber this. He says, "The future has several names. For the weak, it is the impossible. For the faint-hearted, it is the unknown. For the thoughtful and the valiant, it is ideal. The chall nge is urgent, the past is large, the time is now." You know, that was written more than 100 years ago, and yet, it's so appropriate. | The future has several names. For those who are frightened or weak, it's impossible. Don't tell me about it, don't bother me. I'm frightened already. For the faint-hearted, a person who has no sense of adventure, courage, well, it's the unknown. I don't want to hear about it. I am afraid to venture forth. For the thoughtful and the valiant, Hugo said it is the ideal, it's perfect. Give me a chance to get at it. When do we start? And then he goes on and says, the chall nge is urgent," and that's what it is right now. That's why you're here. The past is large, the time is now. Let me tell you something, that's been true in every generation. Now, many speakers will come to you, and tell you that you're the generation. Oh you face immense problems. Well, let me THE tell ye, when I was your age they told me same thing, and it was true. Every generation faces immense problems. | Can you imagine what the first generation of settlers in this country faced? Can you imagine what those who wrote the Constitution faced? Can you imagine \*\* those who wrote

the Declaration of Independence, and their average age was 36? Is there were a number of men who were under 30 that signed that Declaration of Independence. Thomas Jefferson was only 33, when he pened the whole business, rolled it all up. I'll tell you that the past was big and large. The challenge was urgent. They weren't sure from what they'd lose their heads. And every year, every year our republic has been the same. Succession for the first fifty years of this republic, succession. Then came the first between the states, can you imagine anything that was more terrifying? The incredible corruption after that war, the process of reconstruction. Ahh, every generation has been the same. The only difference is that every generation is better equiped. Each generation has different problems, and in many ways the problems are bigger and greater. But in each way you're better equiped. Today you're better educated, you're better informed. When I was your age, I get I had never been into a community larger than Sioux Falls, South Dakota before I went to the University of Minnesota. I had never been out of the State of South Dakota, but once in my life. I was born in South Dakota. But, I'll let you know that I made in the town in which I was born of 77 people. But, the next one which I lived in had 600, finally I got up to a town of 10,000. I was on the move you see, I was really making progress, slow, but I was making progress.

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And, then I had the great experience of going to the University of Minnesota. It was a whole new world for Now, look where you are. You've been here a week. You have seen the people who make the history of your time. You've been to the Nation's capitol, and despite all that's said about it, all that's said about this city, all that's said about this government. It's one of the most beautiful cities in the world. Make no mistake about it, and this government is one of the great democracies of the workd. There aren' many of them left, you know, there are only 27. are an endangered species. Out of 150 and some nations on the face of the globe, there are 27 that can call themselves democracies where there's universal suffrage. Just think of that. And..... have those homogenious people. Japan, France, Norway, Sweden, Finland. In each of those countries 90-to 95% of the people are of one race or one creed, or one origin. What are we? Everything. Every walk of life, every religion, every race, every color, we are a heterogenious people. We are a great political mosaic. And, the most difficult task in the world is to govern, and to hold together a social structure in which the parts are all different. If you've ever watched a great artist ever put a mosaic together, every little stone has to be put there, and it has to be fitted in. And, anything that isn't done properly, it tends to crack or to break. a XEXHXHS learning process. All I'm trying to tell you is not that we're perfect, because we're not, bemocracy is never perfect because it's human. We're falible, not infalible, we're people not gods. We'll make mistakes. Now, every once in a while you run into somebody in politics who thinks that he's a saint, but I've never run on the ..... ticket, because I didn't think there were enough people who would support me. I never pretended I've MEXEX got plenty of human weaknesses. My task, like yours, is to do better . | I had a reporter not long ago, six, seven months ago when I was getting ready to run for re-election out in he said to me, Well, Senator, now that you've my home state, and been in Washington all these years, what is your goal? [And, I replied, my goal is to do better. He looked at me, and said, Now wait, Senator, that's not an answer, you're being evasive." I said, Well, you asked the question, I didn't, and I answered it. My answer is to do better. He said, I don't consider that an answer. I said, that is unimportant to me whether you consider that an answer. What is important to me is that I want to do better. I'd like to be a better father, husband, grandfather. I'd like to be a better citizen, I'd like to be a better Senator. I know I can't be perfect in any of these. Even the found fathers of this republic said that all they were trying to do was make a more perfect union, not a perfect

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union, a more perfect union. So, what my message is, don't lose faith. Bad news always makes headlines. Man bites dog, that's news, dog bites man, so what, it happens all the time. what I'm trying to get to you, is this. Don't be oly antish, don't go around saying we're perfect. You're not going to do that. But, don't be a cynic. \[ I know sometimes that there are some people who think that they prove themselves intellectuals if they run around looking like they've got a chronic belly-ache, you know they frown. Their brows curled, they're not intellecturals, they're just miserable. By the same token, you go running around looking like you're just jolly all day. You've got to have some sense of balance. I've had people say to me, one of your problems, Mr. Humphrey, is that you're not tough enough. I'm being very frank with you, and I suppose there may be something to it. But, I've said, well, look there's as toughies in the world without me. ..... here. I mean that very sincerely. And ultimately, in the long run, the most important thing is to be able to live with yourself. My plea to you, and my emphasis to you is that this is your country, this is my land and this is your land.
