DR. RUSSELL PETERSON, MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING
BOARD OF NEW DIRECTIONS, AND FELLOW COLLEAGUES, IT
IS, INDEED, A PLEASURE FOR ME TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS
RECEPTION HONORING MEMBERS OF THE 95TH CONGRESS.

THAT NEW DIRECTIONS IS AN ORGANIZATION WHOSE TIME

IS LONG OVERDUE. IT IS AN ORGANIZATION COMPRISED

OF INDIVIDUALS REPRESENTING A VAST CROSS-SECTION

OF OUR SOCIETY. IT IS AN ORGANIZATION REACHING

DOWN TO THE GRASS-ROOTS CITIZENRY OF THIS COUNTRY

IN AN EFFORT TO FIND COMMON AND RATIONAL SOLUTIONS

TO COMMON BUT OFTEN IRRATIONAL GLOBAL CONCERNS.

IT IS AN ORGANIZATION SPAWNED OF A REALIZATION
THAT THE NATIONS OF THIS PLANET ARE, INDEED, TRULY
INTERDEPENDENT AND THAT THE FUTURE OF MANKIND IS
INEXTRICABLY TIED TO THE FATE OF EACH AND EVERY
INDIVIDUAL ON THE FACE OF THIS GLOBE.

THE GLOBAL PROBLEMS FACING HUMANITY ARE,

INDEED, COMPLEX AND ALL-PERVASIVE. THE PROBLEMS OF

HUNGER, POVERTY, ILLITERACY, WASTE OF RESOURCES,

DETERIORATION OF OUR ENVIRONMENT, UNCHECKED POPULA
TION GROWTH, CONFLICT, AND THE CONTINUAL THREAT OF

NUCLEAR HOLOCAUST ALL WEIGH VERY HEAVILY ON THE

THEY DEMAND UNDERSTANDING IF WE ARE TO

COHERENTLY FASHION NATIONAL POLICIES WHICH RESPOND

EFFECTIVELY TO THEIR RESOLUTION.

THEY DEMAND A BROAD-BASED CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

IF WE ARE TO SUSTAIN A LONG-TERM NATIONAL WILL

REQUIRED FOR A SUCCESSFUL EFFORT.

THEY DEMAND RESOLUTION IF MANKIND AS A SPECIES
IS TO SURVIVE FAR INTO THE FUTURE.

ALL TOO OFTEN THE FOREIGN POLICY DECISIONS OF
THIS NATION HAVE BEEN MARKED BY LITTLE MORE THAN
A RESPONSE TO CRISES.

AND ALL TOO OFTEN THE GLOBAL COMMUNITY,

OF WHICH THE UNITED STATES IS AN INTEGRAL PART,

HAS PAID A HEAVY PRICE FOR OUR HESITATION AS A

NATION--TO WHICH THE VAST MAJORITY OF THE WORLD'S

PEOPLE LOOK FOR INSPIRATION, VISION, LEADERSHIP

AND GUIDANCE.

YET, IT DOES NOT HAVE TO BE SO. IT MUST NOT CONTINUE TO BE SO.

FOR, IF THE FOREIGN POLICY DECISION-MAKING

PROCESS OF A NATION IS ANYTHING, IT IS THE FORESIGHT

AND WISDOM TO PREVENT CRISES FROM OCCURRING, NO

MATTER HOW REMOTE THEIR LIKELIHOOD.

As Dr. Peterson has noted, the problems are frightening. The unresolved problems, and I quote, "about energy resources and nuclear development, the population bomb, the arms race, the confrontation between the have and the have-not nations. All of these are inextricably tied to national policies."

I MIGHT ALSO ADD THAT IF WE SHOULD HAVE LEARNED ONE THING, IT IS THE FACT THAT THE UNITED STATES

CANNOT SURVIVE AS AN ISLAND OF WEALTH IN A SEA OF POVERTY. THAT SHOULD BE THE ONE LESSON BROUGHT HOME BY THE ENERGY CRISIS. OUR FATE AND OUR OWN ECONOMIC VIABILITY ARE TIED TO THAT OF THE REST OF THE GLOBE.

THEREFORE, IN CONCLUDING MY REMARKS I WANT TO WISH NEW DIRECTIONS, ITS PRESIDENT, ITS GOVERNING

BOARD AND COUNCIL NOTHING BUT OVERWHELMING SUCCESS

IN THEIR EFFORTS NOT ONLY TO EDUCATE THE CONGRESS

BUT ALSO TO BUILD THAT ALL-IMPORTANT GRASS-ROOTS

SUPPORT.

FOR, IT WILL BE ONLY THROUGH THE ACTIVE AND

INTELLIGENT PARTICIPATION ON THE PART OF THE AMERICAN

PEOPLE THAT OUR POLICIES RESPONDING TO THESE COMPLEX

INTERNATIONAL ISSUES WILL BE SUSTAINABLE.
