Dear Dad,

I made aunt Gertrude a thumb-nail sketch like this, so I thought I'd make you one. It makes it a little clearer than the other pictures, which only showed what could be seen from my place but not what the place itself looked like. I have cut down on the trees a little so you can see more of the place.

As you see, I have (just colored my property and left the rest in pen + ink. In the immediate foreground is the little beach; and the post and carria are beyond. The house where I am living at present is the stepped down one at the top of the property. The window where I did the three other watercolors is a bay window which I have painted blue. You see how the bulk of the property is consumed by the tennis court. The nice trees, the house I am now building, and the old fort are all in the foreground, as is the pointed terrace I built overlooking the beach. You see that it is a reduced version of Pescadero point. The picture you sent me of the Pebble Beach view is very much like Carris. Thanks also for the other pictures of the Gavin lunch. It looks like lots of fun. I wish I had been there. Norman seems to be larger than ever, Betty looks well. Thanks also for the interesting clippings and the note, with news of Corty. I hope to see him at Thanksgiving before he leaves. I'm leaving here day after tomorrow and should be in New York on the 11<sup>th</sup> of

November, if there is no delay.

I was lucky enough the other day to find some very old photographs taken of my place in the 1880's showing how the foot used to look. I had mentally reconstructed it just about right from the remains that are here, - but I see that it is not as ancient as I thought. It isn't much more than a century old. It is interesting that the house I am putting up, follows pretty closely the original structure, - at least in plan, if not in elevation. I got a beautiful front door today, a nutwood with fine iron for about \$18.00.

Have been able to put in one or two large trees, so they can get a chance to get started during the rainy season. They are (guess what!) Monterey cypresses, and are already about ten or fifteen years old. It is impossible to do anything about a garden yet until the workmen finish pouring cement all over everything. I'll bring home lots of pictures. Should be there by Thanksgiving, and if not, will certainly be home for the last two or three weeks of December. I hope you're feeling fine.
